

EDITORIAL

"We were here." I said, moving the salt cellar a few inches across the table. The mess had put on a damn fine meal, all things considered, the port had circulated and the talk had turned, as it so often does, to campaigns past. "Over here, far side of the Channel," I continued, seizing a pepper mill, "was the enemy. Of course, we didn't have a clue to his true identity then, so we just called it 'Chinese-flu'. The official name - 'The Virus' - didn't come in to general use until later on. Gad, it was ages back, but I remember it as if it were yesterday." A suspicion of a tear formed in my rheumy old campaigner's eye but was quickly blinked away. Some of the younger element put their phones down for a splitsecond in disbelief. "What did you do?" they chorused. I settled in my chair. "I was in an outfit called 1/3 Cambridgeshire Heavy Anchorites." I explained. "We'd been formed earlier that year by a prescient government - this was before we became part of 7 Armoured PPE, of course, that was much later. The enemy gradually overcame resistance in mainland Europe, country after country toppling into the abyss with lightning speed. Soon, there was nothing between us and it but La Manche. Back then, we called this 'The Phoney Epidemic' - we were on permanent alert, but all the action seemed to be elsewhere."

We must honour and cherish all these people as we look for a new dawn.

Which raises the second question of how we re-think and re-build in ways that are genuinely different and genuinely inclusive such that none of us live at the expense of another? I don't even know if that is possible, but it is surely the stuff hopes and dreams are made of.

Collecting prescriptions

Reading post and making phone calls on your behalf

Spend time with you to have a chat

You will receive a 2 week FREE trial and after that we ask for a small charge of £9 per week for a single person and £11 per week for a couple. Below are some quotes from people that use our service.

The Council is your locally elected Council at the first tier of local government. Meetings are open to the public and are usually held on the first Monday of each month (excepting August) at the Toft People's Hall in School Lane starting at 7.00pm.

Notices of meetings and agendas are published on the Parish Council Noticeboard near the bus shelter together with minutes, which can also be viewed at www.toft.org.uk. Among other things, the Council considers local planning applications for the planning authority, the South Cambridgeshire District Council; provides the local recreation area, the People's Hall, litter bins, dog waste bins and the bus shelter; arranges for local verge cutting on behalf of the Cambridgeshire County Council and works with that authority to ensure the maintenance of local footpaths.

Next Meeting: Monday April 12th 7.00 pm (via Zoom)

The Parish Council met via Zoom on 1st March.

Cllr Tall reported on his discussions with the CC regarding the condition of the verges outside of the church. The CC confirmed that the verges do belong to them. The only process to secure CC funding for improvements would be via the LHI scheme where each year PC's can request funding for road improvements. The CC put aside a certain amount of funding for this but it is a competition and not all schemes are supported. This approach would take several years with no guarantee of success. The CC also said that the only solution that would be agreed would be by installing "concrete grass". Cllr Tall agreed to investigate costs for such an installation so that the PC can consider whether it should look for ways of funding such improvements.

The PC has already agreed to pledge £5k to support a judicial review should the EWR Co not fairly consider the Northern route for the railway. It was agreed how to fund the contribution in line with the strict rules that apply regarding such funding from PC's.

The EWR have written to the PC asking on what grounds a judicial review would be sought and offered to attend a PC meeting to discuss further. It was agreed that the PC would take the lead from Cambridge Approaches how best to respond to the request as it is CA who would lead the review on behalf of local PC's.

The PC has responded to the Greater Cambridgeshire Local Plan following their "Call for Sites" giving initial thoughts on the proposed sites in the Toft area.

Toft Social Club have approached the PC for support funding to pay for the licence for the Zoom used by the club. The PC agreed to the funding. The costs will come from the community funds that have been passed to the PC.

The PC agreed to post the South Cambridgeshire Development Survey from Anthony Brown onto "Nextdoor" as the survey is for individual residents to complete rather than PC's.

The PC decided not to respond to the consultation on the Draft Local Validation Checklist or the new Housing Policies.

The PC wanted to thank Daniel Forester and his mother Sarah for volunteering to clean the play equipment in the rec. It is a good job done.

Cllr Tall reported on the six current items listed on the CC website for reporting highway issues including some breaking up of the road surface on School Lane and the flooding from the manhole on Brookside.

Cllr Miles was congratulated for her work in putting together an updated Welcome Pack that is given to new residents in the village.

Once complete it will be printed for distribution.

Cllr Popat reported that the Climate Change Working party had been active with attendance at the forthcoming seminars hosted by the DC as well as compiling articles for the Calendar.

As you may know, step 2 of the Government's roadmap out of lockdown includes libraries. If all goes to plan this should mean that we will be in a position to offer managed browsing again in our open sessions, hopefully, from mid-April. However, please do check the website and the Libraries social media platforms for the exact dates and arrangements.

Managed browsing will give customers the opportunity to browse the shelves again and to issue their own books. Numbers in the building will be limited to

ensure everyone's safety, and we will be required to comply with the Government Track and Trace protocol. As you enter the library, we will ask you to scan the displayed QR code on the NHS Covid 19 app, if you have this on your phone, or, alternatively, we can take contact details, which we will keep for 21 days.

We know from our previous brief experiences of managed browsing that many of our customers welcomed the opportunity to choose and issue their own books. However, we are also aware that some customers may prefer to continue to drop off and collect pre-ordered books. We will continue to offer our free 'Select and Collect' service, together with our usual reservation system, currently 50p per item for adult library users and free for children with their own library cards.

Our online services are also available as normal, but our e-books, eAudiobooks, eMagazines, and eComics have now moved to Overdrive. All new borrowing will be via Overdrive on a pc and the Libby app on a tablet or phone. If you have not already done so, and you use a tablet or phone, please download the Libby app from your appstore. Further information is available on the Library pages of the County Council website.

The library will be closed on Easter Monday, 5th April, but will be open again on Wednesday 7th April from 1.00 – 5.00pm, under the current lockdown protocol.

We look forward to seeing you at Comberton Library, and hope that, as we move from Spring to Summer, the restrictions will continue to ease. We wish you all a Happy Easter.

[Comberton Library is situated in the Village College campus, with car parking available and is Wheelchair-friendly and fully accessible for all.]


A Message from Alison...

On The Buses...

As part of the Devolution Deal in 2017 that established the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA), responsibility for Transport Authority functions transferred from Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) and Peterborough City Council (PCC) to the CPCA. One of the areas that a Transport Authority is responsible for is any provision of public transport services, including contracted local bus services, community transport and concessionary travel. Since 2017, although the CPCA have been responsible for public transport they have delegated that responsibility to CCC and PCC to carry out the day-to-day delivery on their behalf. However, in October 2020 the CPCA notified both Council's that it intended to operate the day-to-day delivery directly. From 1st April, therefore, the current public transport functions will transfer from CCC and PCC and will be provided direct by the CPCA. The current provision of bus services, community transport and concessionary travel scheme arrangements will continue from 1st April and the public should see no change, apart from some contact details, to the services they use. Contact details are being finalised and those directly affected will be written to shortly.

'They also serve'

Most well-off and prominent people in the past would have several servants carrying out various roles in the household. In the late nineteenth century in our area, the wonderfully entitled *Cambridge Chronicle and University Journal, Isle of Ely Herald, and Huntingdonshire Gazette* published many advertisements seeking suitable servants. In 1890, Mr F. W. E. Beldam placed two such advertisements in the paper. 'The Rectory' here refers to what we now know as Toft Manor.

anted, thorough GROOM-COACHMAN,-Apply, Mr. Beldam, Toft Rectory, near Cambridge.

(Feb 21, 1890)

The Oxford English Dictionary gives the following gloss of 'thorough': 'Designating a servant who undertakes all kinds of domestic work. Now rare.'

anted, immediately, a STABLE-BOY, able to ride and drive. -- Apply, F. Beldam, Esq., Toft Rectory, near Cambridge.

(Dec 12, 1890)

The Beldams were extensive landowners and held the Manor of Toft from 1846 to 1920, when the Manor passed into the hands of Mr G. M. Mcfarlane-Grieve. The village has Beldam's Close among its street names.

- Find a safe place for your café. It can be on your patio, or it can be hidden in a sheltered spot. Of course, hedgehogs need to be able to get in and out of your garden to start with, so if that isn't yet the case, make holes at the bottom of fences (check with your neighbours) and let some areas of your garden and lawn become overgrown for these and other shy creatures.
- Get a sturdy box (wood or plastic) with a removable lid for your feeding station. It needs to be big enough for a hedgehog to fit in - a plastic storage box is a popular choice. You can also install a tunnel to prevent cats or foxes stealing the food.
- Create a hedgehog-sized hole at the base of one of the sides of your box. It should be about 13cm square so the hog can get in and out safely. If your box is wooden, you'll need a saw. If your box is plastic, carefully use a sharp knife. Cover the edges of the hole with duct tape to make sure there are no sharp bits that could hurt your hedgehogs.
- Add your grub. As the sun goes down lay shallow dishes of hedgehog-friendly food and water inside the box. Hedgehogs will eat wet cat food or dog food or cat biscuits, as well as, "Hedgehog Food" which you can buy from pet shops. Make sure you don't put out too much food, as it's not nice to have leftovers lying around, and just remember that what we provide is supplementary to their natural diet, so do not overfeed your 'hogs. Never feed hedgehogs milk or bread as they can't digest them and it upsets their stomachs. Also, be aware that putting any food out will attract all sorts of wildlife, not just hedgehogs – this includes predators.
- Add your roof. Put the lid on top of the box and place a brick or two on top of the lid.
- This will stop a fox or your own dog or cat tipping the box up or dragging it away.

 Clear away any leftovers in the morning and refill your dishes every evening, or for as long as the food is being eaten. Make sure to wash your hands and thoroughly
- wash the feeding dishes, as hedgehogs have been known to spread diseases.

 Don't worry if a hedgehog doesn't move in right away they are so scarce these days that it may take time. And remember that you won't see any activity between October and March or April, when they're hibernating.
- Time to watch. Very quietly as the sun goes down, go out and sit somewhere within view of the box and hopefully you'll be rewarded with a view of this snuffling, grunting little beauty.
