#### EDITORIAL

As you rise, swinking and sweating, slowly into a standing position, one hand clutching your back and as you survey, with a sinking heart, all that is still left to be done in your garden, you may have asked yourself 'Is this really worth it? Is the day Thou gavest, Lord, really to be spent plucking innumerable tiny weeds from my top-soil, in the sure and certain knowledge that they will be back - in triplicate - by this time next week'?

And the answer is: It kind of depends. Because if you're a fan of 're-wilding', the currently fashionable trend for letting Nature take its course, then you'll more than willingly park yourself in the 'No' camp. But if you like a bit of order in your garden and feel that nature usually needs a helping hand, the wellie will be firmly on the other foot.

So, who's right?

We all know that some of our loveliest landscapes and views owe their existence to human efforts, just as we all know that the dreary monoculture we see in some places does as little for the animal world as it does for the human soul. Offset against that, however, is the fact that that same monoculture is what feeds us. But when it comes to our own small patch, what sort of balance should we Putting aside an instinctive distrust of anyone strike? claiming to be an expert on pretty much anything, I wondered what the Royal Horticultural Society felt about the matter. And here, pithily précised, is their view: ""The presence of a wide range of invertebrates, such as ladybirds, springtails, spiders and even caterpillars are indicators of a diverse garden eco-system, and so should be encouraged. And the best way to do that is to forget the weeding, strimming, mowing, hoeing and raking for a while." So, the RHS are all for it, then? Not exactly, because they go on to say that "A garden that is just left to 'rewild' may revert to scrub or be dominated by a single species, which may be worse for biodiversity. We support planet-friendly gardening practices that work with both cultivated and wild nature for the benefit of plants, people and the planet." Well, quite. I mean - who wouldn't? I bet they also 'heart' Mum and Dad, puppies and apple pie.

If I've understood them correctly - and that's always a big 'If' - I think they are saying that you should use your common sense, all too often a desperate last resort in my case. By all means let nature have a crack at your garden but don't be afraid to step in with a bit of coaxing, nudging and, when that fails, mowing and digging. Apparently, the Romans were pretty good at this (certainly, they had a neat way of hedging: get a length of tarry rope, roll it in seeds and bury it in a shallow trench, any shape or curve you like. Many of those, or their descendants, are still with us, I'm told).

If you're anything like me, you're likely to over or undershoot on this at your first attempt. But if you do wind up with a bit more of a wilderness than you truly desired and find the neighbours tutting over the fence at your efforts, try to mollify them with this: "I'm not lazy - I'm an ecologist!"



Many of you will already be aware that School Lane recently became a 20mph maximum speed zone. We have been waiting a long time for this, so, it's a huge relief to finally have it in place.

It is hoped that the speed restriction will help children and pets play safely, and due to the lack of good pavement on School Lane, pedestrians will feel happier about using the road to walk on at some sections, as many of us already do.

The Parish Council would like to thank everyone in advance for doing their best to not exceed the 20mph maximum speed, and, going forward, we hope to succeed in our bids for more 20mph zones throughout the village.

**CORONATION RECIPES** As promised, one this month the other next.

#### Elizabethan Pork

This was originally researched and published by Michael Smith - for 6 people

1  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb leg of pork  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz white flour

Celery 2 tbsp. oil

1 onion 1/4 bot. red wine or cider or strong ale

4 ozs tinned apricots 1/2 tsp. each of; marjoram, thyme, cinnamon

3ozs seedless raisins mace, black pepper, mild curry powder

1/2 lemon 1 1/2 crushed clove of garlic

1/2 orange salt & pepper

3 ozs stoned dates

1 large apple

1/2 tbsp. Honey

Cut pork into 1" squares and dredge with flour. Fry the meat in oil till lightly brown. Fry the finely chopped onions and celery – place all in oven-proof pot or heavy duty pan if cooking on top of stove. Sprinkle over remaining flour. Add: drained and chopped apricots, raisins, juice and grated rind of lemon and orange; roughly chopped dates, honey, wine, garlic and herbs. Core and slice the apples and lay on top. Cover with lid and cook in oven gas mark 3, 325°f for 3 hours or, on very low heat on top of stove, also for about 3 hours.

This should be served with chopped walnuts - cooked in butter till hot and segments of orange.

report back when she has considered these and the costs involved. She also reported that there is no evidence of a "Give Way" sign at the junction of Comberton Road and Hardwick Road and this will be taken up with Highways.

Cllr Miles reported that the Woodland Trust would be happy for the village to position bat/bird boxes and insect hotels in Toft Wood. It was felt that it would be a good project to engage villagers in, particularly young people, and Cllrs. Miles, Darbyshire and Harris have agreed to carry this project forward with a view to holding an event during the school holidays. Time and venue to be announced.

While these proposals are original improvements to the plan, Cambridge Approaches will continue to fight for the Northern route with support from the Parish Council.

# Howzat! Cricket in Toft

During this season of test matches, we look back on cricket in Toft and its surprisingly long history. The earliest mention of cricket being played in Toft is in an 1840 publication about cricket in Cambridgeshire. In the 1920s and 1930s, Toft had a team which played in the field behind Old Farm. There was a hiatus during WWII, then play resumed and games are known to have continued in the field behind Old Farm during 1945-8. In the early 1950s, games took place in a field known as the 20-acre meadow behind Manor Farm; play later transferred to Mr Ken Tebbit's field behind Manor Cottages. Geoff Balcombe (School Lane) remembers games in the 1960s played in the field behind the Home Meadow residential home. Many thanks to Geoff for a lot of the information recorded here.

The players wore dark green caps with a 'T' embroidered on them. Players included Koran, Paul, Malcolm, Peter and Derick Collett, Reg, Bernie, Pat and Ronnie Ward, Geoff Balcombe, and Len Halsall.





#### Cancer support service receives 'much deserved' Carer Friendly Tick

The award is in recognition of their work to identify and support unpaid carers - people that look after a family member or friend.

Unpaid carers being recognised by the hospital has benefits to the carer, the person they look after, and enables the hospital staff to fulfil their roles more effectively.

Sarah Jayne Rodwell, Senior Cancer Support Advisor at Cambridge University Hospital Cancer Support Service said, "The Cancer Support Service being awarded the Carer Friendly Tick Award – Health gives carers accessing our service assurance that we value the important role they play in our patients' pathway."

A panel of carers assessed the submission from the Trust on behalf of Caring Together. The panel were impressed by the range of work being carried out by the team, and the impact that this has on both carers and those they care for. A panel member added, "I love the tuck box idea, how often do carers go hungry or thirsty because they don't want to leave a loved one alone while they take a drink break."

The cancer support service's work includes:

introduction of the Carers Passport - carer identification within a health setting

promotion of the Carers Handbook

staff trained in carer awareness, provided in-house and by Caring Together and Cambridge Cancer Help Centre

carer information displayed on department information boards and on social media.

Jill Nooij, Awareness and Voice Delivery Lead at Caring Together said it has been a pleasure to work with Sarah and her colleagues and added, "They have shown a real commitment to supporting carers. It's clear that they have a good understanding of the challenges faced by carers and how they can provide support within their department and the wider hospital. Their enthusiasm has even spread to other hospitals. Congratulations on achieving the Carer Friendly Tick, it's very much deserved!"

The Carer Friendly Tick Award was originally developed for education by young carers from Caring Together's Norfolk Young Carers Forum (NYCF). The awards recognise the important role organisations have to play in ensuring carers of all ages are recognised and given the support they need. Wildlife Trust West Cambridgeshire Hundreds Update: Aug 2023



Late summer is a good time to enjoy watching bats. Sunset is not too late and both adults and juveniles are on the wing.

Did you know that a common pipistrelle bat (one of the most common bats in the UK) weighs around 5 grams and might eat 3,000 insects in one night? On a guided walk last year we saw them making use of the insect haven that is the sewage treatment works beside Waresley and Gransden Woods. The very rare Barbastelle bat, often associated with deciduous woodland, has also been recorded here on our formal bat surveys. On Cambourne Nature Reserve we regularly see Daubenton's bats which specialise in catching insects over water.

Bats may fly several kilometres from their roost to their feeding ground, which is why having a connected landscape is important. Bats will make use of hedgerows, gardens, river corridors, and verges to move around, so every piece of wilder space counts. In the West Cambs 100s (the area of land between Gamlingay, Cambourne and Comberton) The Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs and Northants are working with partners to create a Living Landscape, making it easier for wildlife to move around. Landowners, farmers, residents and local councillors are all part of the solution to wildlife declines.

You can help bats in your garden by planting moth-friendly plants, like honeysuckle and jasmine for nectar, and stinging nettle and currents for caterpillar food. Leaving parts of your garden wild will also provide more habitat for insects and therefore food for bats.

The Wildlife Trust for Beds Cambs and Northants offer a variety of specialist walks through the year. Further afield you can canoe with bats, or go on a family bat walk.

Just space to squeeze in a couple of anniversaries in the life and evolution of our village:

It's seventy years since Toft was connected to mains electricity, recorded by the local paper as follows: "In the oil-lit schoolroom at Toft on Thursday before Christmas, the chairman of the Parish Council pressed a button, and electricity came to the village. The school was crowded for the official switching-on ceremony. The original proposals were made in 1939 but were held up by the war. With the nationalisation of the supply industry a programme for orderly development was drawn up. Toft and Caldecote were among the first villages in the Cambridge district to receive a supply, which would serve about 70 consumers. They welcomed the arrival of electricity and looked forward to the enjoyment of its many advantages. There were demonstrations of domestic appliances and cookery and washing machines. "

Meanwhile, 125 years ago, villagers petitioned for a railway station at Toft. I suspect views on the desirability of that particular facility have altered since then....
