# Hospital early intervention team receives Carer Friendly Tick Award

The early intervention team at Cambridge University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust (CUH) has been awarded Caring Together's Carer Friendly Tick Award (Health), in recognition of their work to identify and support carers.

On behalf of Caring Together, a charity supporting people caring for family members or friends, a panel of carers assessed the submission from the Trust.

The panel were impressed by the range of work being carried out by the team, and the impact that this has on both carers and those they care for.

A member of the Caring Together assessment panel said, "It is clear that the early intervention team at the CUH is actively promoting the support of carers both in patient and staff settings and that they are succeeding in developing a 'carer friendly ethos' which can only have a positive impact on patient care.

The Trust was awarded the Carer Friendly Tick (Health) Award for reasons including:

Several staff within the team have volunteered for the role of carers champion.

A carer's agreement has been developed with input from the carers' forum.

Andv McGowan, head of engagement at Caring Together, said, "With three in five of us likely to be a carer at some stage in our lives we are very pleased to see the Trust working in partnership with carers to identify and support people looking after family members or friends within health settings. The work that they are doing makes a real difference.

The Council is your locally elected Council at the first tier of local government. Meetings are open to the public and are usually held on the first Monday of each month (excepting August) at the Toft People's Hall in School Lane starting at 7.00pm.

Notices of meetings and agendas are published on the Parish Council Noticeboard near the bus shelter together with minutes, which can also be viewed at www.toft.org.uk. Among other things, the Council considers local planning applications for the planning authority, the South Cambridgeshire District Council; provides the local recreation area, the People's Hall, litter bins, dog waste bins and the bus shelter; arranges for local verge cutting on behalf of the Cambridgeshire County Council and works with that authority to ensure the maintenance of local footpaths.

# Next Meeting: Monday 5th December, 7.00pm in The People's Hall. All Welcome.

- The Parish Council met on 7th November 2022 at 7.30pm preceded at 7.00pm by the William Eversden Charity AGM at which a number of allotment tenants were present and following discussions it was agreed that:
- permission for the planting of perennial plants need not be sought in future;
- it would not be compulsory to remove any perennial plants at the end of a tenancy unless on the express wish of the new tenant;
- espalier supports for bushes/trees which would remain at approximately 2 metres height was permissible;
- in addition to the present permission to erect a small hut of approximately 1<sup>2</sup> x 2 metres high, low-level roof-style erections over water butts to maximise the collection of rain water would also be permitted.
- It was reported that the work on the water bore was on-going but delayed due to the bore-making equipment having broken on a couple of occasions because of large rocks underground. The Chair is to seek further information in order to assess the feasibility of the project.
- Finally, it was agreed unanimously that the allotment rents would be increased to £15 per annum beginning in 2023 in order to cover administrative costs. The meeting closed at 7.40pm.
- The Parish Council Meeting followed immediately afterwards and there were no declarations of interest or written dispensations.
- It was noted that there are still two vacancies on the Parish Council to be filled and volunteers would be welcome. Please speak to any Councillors or call Martin Yeadon on 263663 if interested.
- Regarding Climate Change and Green Issues, Cllr Collinson agreed to contact the SCC representative to see what suggestions /projects were possible for a small village such as Toft and will report back at the next meeting.
- Discussions are on-going regarding the erection of a noticeboard on the Birdlings site.

- Following previous canvassing of residents at the Birdlings resulting in many declining to receive a paper version of the Calendar, it was felt that the best way forward would be to ensure that the Calendar was published promptly on the village website and this was more widely known.
- The update from CCC regarding the matter of parking outside the Church was discussed and it was felt that given the enormous costs involved we could not progress this issue.
- The matter of EWR was discussed and Cllr Yeadon was able to report that at 2 meetings he had attended issues such as freight, traction and the Northern route were raised but there is no further information and no decisions have been made. The results of the existing EWR consultation should come out in the new year.
- Regarding the Recreational Play area, following suggestions to investigate "percussion-play" equipment at the last meeting, Cllr Watson tabled two descriptions of equipment that would be suitable. It is hoped that if she can find grants, the Parish Council will match- fund to support the purchase of these.
- Cllr Watson also brought to the meeting a design of a new noticeboard for the playground. She also confirmed that she had tidied up the area and twigs and branches have been piled into a corner ready for removal.
- Community Gritting volunteer. Cllr Watson is to explore what is involved and may take on the role if not too arduous.
- Information regarding the CCC Transport Strategies 2022 can be found at https://consultcambs.uk.engagementhq.com/
- It was confirmed that the Toft Shop has been added to the Assets of Community Value.
- The ditch adjacent to the Recreation ground which has been blocked for some time has now been cleared by the landowners.
- The Finance report was approved.
- . There were no play inspection reports nor urgent matters to discuss.
- A planning application was presented and the Parish Council had no comment to make.
- Cllr Yeadon reported that the village maintenance work needed following the annual assessment had been carried out satisfactorily by the new person appointed.
- New requests for 20-mph have been put on hold as LHI is currently looking at new initiatives regarding a more comprehensive policy on 20mph zones in the county. The 20mph zone for School Lane is going ahead as planned.
- It was agreed that Cllr Darbyshire and Cllr Miles would explore other ways in which traffic could be slowed down on entering the village via the B1046 in both directions.
- Cllr Watson reported that the Village Hall committee is planning to move the entrance door to the front of the building to facilitate ease of access for wheelchair users and exploring the possibility of extending the kitchen which is now too small.
- Footpaths are currently free from damage but it should be noted that SCC has informed us that there is no funding left in the current budget for repairs to gates.
- Further information is awaited on the plans at Birdlings for visitor parking, dates for start/end of build and other matters.
- Cllr Darbyshire reported that Whippet have taken on the running of the No. 18 bus following the removal of this service by Stagecoach. While this is very welcome, it is currently erratic with buses cancelled at very short notice. She reported that Whippet try to keep information up-to-date via Twitter.
- Cllr Miles agreed to represent the Parish Council on the ORB group which has been formed to plan for Toft's celebration of the coronation of King Charles III.
- It was unanimously agreed that the Parish Council invites the Cambridge Nature Network to speak about how to use the Nature Network Toolkit. The aim of CNN is to double the amount of nature rich habitats by 2050 and Toft Parish sits within this network and specifically within the Boulder Clay and Woodlands Priority Area.
- Finally, Cllr Yeadon reported the successful planting of a Purple Beech tree to commemorate the late Queen's Jubilee celebrations and the erection of a plaque commissioned by local artist, John McGill. These have been positioned on a newly-cleared area of the verge on the corner of Mill Lane opposite the village green.

# Toft's first Caroleans

As we've illustrated in previous issues of the *Village Calendar*, Toft has wonderful early manuscript and later printed church records of baptisms, marriages and deaths going back to the reign of King Henry VIII in 1539. This month, since we have a new King, Charles III, we recall the reign of Charles I (1625-1649) and look at what family names were most common in the baptism records of St Andrew's church during the first Carolean era. The graph shows names occurring five times or more, in descending order of frequency.



Last month, we showed some of the family names that occurred frequently in the Toft baptismal register during the reign of Queen Elizabeth I. Some of those names were still around during Charles I's reign: *Newman, Anger, Eversden, Waites and Pecke*. As in Elizabeth I's time, spelling was not fixed. *Anger* alternates with *Angier; Waytes* was recorded in the Elizabethan record variously as *Waytes, Waits, Wayts* and *Wayttes*. In Charles I's time, we find it spelt *Waites* and *Waytes*. *Pecke* was written as *Peck* in the Elizabethan record.

In both Elizabeth I's and Charles I's time, the records were handwritten by individual vicars who would adhere to personal spelling styles, and it is quite likely that families had little or no fixed notion of how their names should be spelt. Variations in the spelling of family names persists to this day (e.g., Clark/Clarke, Sparks/Sparkes) a vestige of earlier times.

#### **The Final Platinum Jubilee Event**

The last act of Toft's Platinum Jubilee celebrations has been the planting of a commemorative Purple Beech and a bronze plaque which was designed and constructed by our local sculptor, John McGill. In years to come the tree will become a striking tall purple column set against the background greenery. The location, adjacent to the Village Green, was originally a village pond but was now heavily overgrown. The Parish Council organised a working party to clear the area ahead of planting the tree and installing the plaque. Further clearance work is proposed by the PC for next year which will help to further expand the area of our Village Green.

Greetings Neighbours,

We have been pleased to be able to hold regular class assemblies to people from outside the school for the first time in over two years. It has been so lovely to see parents and carers visiting Meridian and we look forward to so many more during the academic year.

The children have also enjoyed being visited by people from outside the school – Y6 and Y4 benefitted from lessons from a Professor of Volcanology at the University of Cambridge and KS2 singing assemblies are now being led by the Lordsbridge Singing Project and children will have the opportunity to join community wide projects this year.

The aim of the Lordsbridge Singing Project is to enjoy singing out shared values and bring together the school and church community once each half term. Elements of vocal technique and musical understanding will be embedded into assemblies with aspects of the school's values also covered.

F or many of us, Christmas really begins when they hear that famous first line of 'Once In Royal David's City' sung by a solo choirboy from the chapel at King's College. Here are a few tit-bits you might not know about the service and its origins.

- The first Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols was held on Christmas Eve in 1918. During World War I the dean, Eric Milner-White, had served as army chaplain in the 7th Infantry Division and he was worried that the anguish of the "Great War" had hardened attitudes against religion. He introduced the service to King's as a means of attracting people back to Christian worship.
- The service was originally directed not by a conductor or choirmaster, but by the organist, one Arthur Henry Mann, who continued this tradition until 1929.
- The well-known opening hymn (and treble solo) was not part of the original performance. It was introduced the following year, 1919.
- Although already popular and well-known in the Cambridge area, it was not until 1928 that the service was broadcast on the BBC, a tradition they have maintained to this day with one exception: It was not broadcast in 1930 - no-one seems to know why.
- During World War Two, all the stained glass was removed from the chapel for safe storage and the building was left unheated and open to the elements. Nevertheless, the choir and congregation sang on, although for 'security reasons', the name "King's" was not mentioned during wartime broadcasts.
- The broadcast is heard world-wide. In the US, a 1954 service was put into the National Recording Registry by the Library of Congress in 2008.
- During the more recent Covid lock-down the public were barred from attendance. Nothing daunted, the choir sang and the lessons were read to an empty chapel. That year's broadcast was a pre-recorded version, complete with congregation.

This year, as always, the service will be broadcast on BBC Radio 4 and the BBC World Service on 24 December at 3pm. And - also as usual - there are no tickets left for this year's performance.
