#### ear Friends

#### Candlemas, officially the very last day of Christmas, takes place at the very beginning of February. There are quaint legends associated with Candlemas, St Brigid, also known as St Bride. She's an Irish patron saint, born in 451 AD, but according to legend, she was the midwife to Mary and foster mother to Jesus, and she carried lighted candles in front of Mary as she went up the steps of the Temple and although it was a windy day, the candles didn't blow out! (The legend sadly doesn't say how an Irish woman in the 5th century made it to 1st century Palestine but legends do not have to make sense)ì.

1st February is the first day of Spring according to Celtic thought; the snowdrops should be out, little drops of shining light and green growth sometimes called Candlemas bells or Mary's taper, they also resonate with symbolic significance. There was an important Celtic goddess, also called Brigid, who was the goddess of spring, fertility, healing, poetry. There are lots of miracles associated with Brigid. Understandably there has also been discussion over whether she really existed - perhaps she is a Christianisation of the goddess, or the chief druidess of the goddess. Surely there must have been a midwife for Mary and we shouldn't assume that people didn't travel across the world so it is possible for someone to move from Ireland to Israel even way back in history. Perhaps though she really was a nun who founded a monastery at Kildare in 480, that alone would make her an interesting and memorable woman.

Candlemas celebrations should involve bringing all your new candles to the church to have them blessed. Thus, your year's supply of light has been sanctified and ready to light your home and cast out physical and metaphorical darkness. We could bring all our spare lightbulbs, but modern ones are supposed to last longer and lack the romance of sacred candlelight. We should make a candlelit (torchlit?) procession to the church and recall how Simeon and Anna were waiting in the temple until the moment when they recognise the infant Jesus as the Messiah. I wonder if we could reinvigorate the old tradition – it would be the last chance to sing Christmas carols, to gather in frosty air and sparkling lights before we turn our faces with hope to the increasing daylight that signifies spring.

I'm leading the service on 6th February in the Methodist Church – if you turn up with candles and lightbulbs, I'll know what to do.



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The Council is your locally elected Council at the first tier of local government. Meetings are open to the public and are usually held on the first Monday of each month (excepting August) at the Toft People's Hall in School Lane starting at 7.00pm.

Council Noticeboard near the bus shelter together with minutes, which can also be viewed at www.toft.org.uk. Among other things, the Council considers local planning applications for the planning authority, the South Cambridgeshire District Council; provides the local recreation area, the People's Hall, litter bins, dog waste bins and the bus shelter; arranges for local verge cutting on behalf of the Cambridgeshire County Council and works with that authority to ensure the maintenance of local footpaths.

#### Next Meeting: Monday 7th February 7.00 pm in The People's Hall . All welcome subject to social-distancing guidelines

The Parish Council met on 10th Jan 2022. Cllr Lluis Borrell was absent due to illness.

The PC discussed the first items on the agenda concerning dog bins, litter bins and litter problems in the village. The dog bin by Toft Wood regularly gets overfilled and of course it is good that it is used. Cllr Miles has investigated getting a larger dog bin however the policy with SCDC is to replace dog bins with normal waste bins at a cost of £414 plus an additional charge of £3.00 a week for emptying the bin. The PC also considered a letter from a resident complaining that the bins in Church Road and Brookside also get over full and litter ends up coming out of the bin. If these two bins had more capacity it might also ease the

problem of littering in the vicinity. After some discussion the PC agreed to fund three new enclosed bins and the weekly collection of the Toft Wood bin.

Cllr Ellis-Evans reported on the progress with online training on the Defibrillator (which will be happening soon) and the rota for the weekly maintenance checks. Please check the Toft Village Calendar for details.

It was reported that the bridge on the west end of Lot Meadow has been repaired and a new Post has been erected for the NW gate on Long Meadow. A number of other faults with a number of gates have been added to the CC reporting website.

The PC reviewed the specification for the grass cutting contract. Cllr Ellis-Evans presented her proposals which will mean no cutting during May and less cutting of some verges during the season. The PC does carry out some of the verge cutting on behalf of the CC and so Cllr Notices of meetings and agendas are published on the Parish Ellis-Evans is to check that the CC are OK with the proposals before going out for tender for the contract.

> The PC set the budget for 2022/23. There were a number of increases that needed to be included. Electricity costs for street lighting is expected to significantly increase, insurance costs have increased this year and there are a number of significant projects that the PC may want, or need, to progress including a possible "fighting fund" depending on the next set of proposals from EWR and costs associated with the PC election this May. The budget was set with these issues considered. The PC has not increased the individual households annual precept charge for many years however this year there will be an increase.

The PC considered two planning applications.

James Wrycroft (aided by his family) was thanked for replacing the notice board by the bus stop, and for doing an excellent job. Material that can be used with drawing pins is to be attached to the board over the next few weeks.

#### Wildlife Trust West Cambridgeshire Hundreds Update: Feb 2022

Spring is on the horizon! In February, you can spot early signs in the hedgerows: blackthorn flowers, willow and hazel catkins, and hawthorn and elder leaves. You can also hear our resident birds like blackbirds, chaffinches and yellow hammers singing their territorial songs. In Hardwick Woods you will see bluebell, primrose and oxlip leaves coming up, and you could even hear a great spotted woodpecker drumming. It will be very muddy, so please take wellies, and stick to the middle of paths to avoid trampling plants and compacting soil on the edges. Some nearby reserves have restricted access in winter, so visit our website before you go:

The Wildlife Trust BCN have been trialling work parties on Cambourne Nature Reserve and we want to extend a huge thank you to volunteers who have come along to help. So far, the tasks have included: cutting back overhanging vegetation near Oaks Wood, E-mail: rebecca.neal@wildlifebcn.org removing fly-tipped rubbish, carrying out footpath maintenance on Crow Hill, and improving habitat for wetland birds by removing scrub around Whomping BCN Facebook/Twitter: @wildlifebcn Willow Lake. These work parties have encouraged people to step forward to be rangers, so there are now more volunteers reporting problems, recording wildlife, The West Cambridgeshire Hundreds are a group of and litter-picking.

If you are interested in joining the work party at Cambourne, the next is Sat 12th Feb. Feel free to contact me about other volunteer opportunities including Bourn toad patrol which will be starting up

near the end of February, and weekend work parties at Hardwick Wood.



In the late 1800's there was a small sawmill located in the area of what is now The Mount commercial centre behind the Village Shop. It was owned and operated by the Warboys family and continued as a business into the 1900's offering a variety of timber products and, notably, were also the local coffin makers.

The sawmill would have provided an alternative employment to farm labouring for the village men. This included Bert Sparkes, one of the Toft men commemorated in the Thankful Village memorial who survived the fighting of World War One, and whose first job as a young man was at the sawmill where he made coffins. He used to tell a story of being distracted from his work one day when he spotted a strange object in the sky and followed it up the road towards Hardwick. It proved to be the first aircraft ever seen by people in Toft.

After watching it land near Hardwick he returned, very excited, to work only to be very severely reprimanded as he was now late to finish a coffin needed that day for an important village funeral.

The sawmill unfortunately made the local newspapers in Feb 1911 when Joe Warboys (seen as a youngster in the picture above and now apparently running the business) was reported as having been found guilty by safety inspectors of operating an unguarded sawmill

Heritage Open Day 6 Feb 1.30pm – 3.30pm at Cambridge's Leper Chapel


