EDITORIAL

Elsewhere in this issue of The Calendar, there is lots to read about the plans to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. And quite rightly, too. A working life of seventy years, with not even weekends or Bank Holidays off, is a shift most of us wouldn't want to put in. Here in Toft, of course, tradition dictates that this red-letter day will be celebrated with customary flair, imagination and aplomb. Because, as many will remember, there was a rare old knees-up just ten years ago, when the Diamond Jubilee was celebrated in style, so we have a bench-mark to aim at. More august residents may even recall the village pageant held in celebration of the present monarch's accession to the throne, back in 1953. I can't quite bring this to mind myself, but apparently it was a day to remember - and who can wonder at it, in a country still labouring under rationing and the long, baleful shadow of the war?

However, before the corks start popping, I wonder how many people actually know what a 'jubilee' is and why it is so-named? I certainly didn't, so I nosed around a bit and found out. And, to stop you having to do it yourself, here is the answer - plus a few other route diversions encountered along the way. Originally, the word "jubilee" has its origins in Judaism. Every seventh year, according to the Hebrew Bible, farmers were commanded to let their land lie fallow, and slaves were freed. The celebration of the Jubilee is the fiftieth year, that is, the year after seven Sabbatical cycles. More recently (well, not that much more recently, as it started in 1300 AD) in the Roman Catholic faith, a Jubilee is a special year of remission of sins and universal pardon. It maintains the tradition of being celebrated every fifty years, although occasional extra ones are added 'depending on need'. A jubilee is known as 'ordinary' if it falls after the set period of years or 'extraordinary' if it is proclaimed for some outstanding event. And it's on that basis - an extraordinary event that we have adopted it into our modern usage. habit of associating a special metal with Jubilees - Silver, Gold etc - is comparatively recent. We have no idea, for example, how (or even if) Henry III celebrated his fifty years in post, but we do know that by the time George III clocked-up his half-century in 1811, a national rave-up was quite the thing. Probably a bit wasted on poor old George, though, as by then he'd rather lost the plot and his son had been appointed Regent.

We all know that Elizabeth II is the first British monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee. But she's not the only ruler to do that. Amongst others, Louis XIV of France, King Bhumibol of Thailand and - you didn't think I was going to forget him, did you? - Sobhuza II of Swaziland have all made the cut. But what happens next? What if someone, someday, clocks up eighty years, or, more implausibly, ninety? What would that be called? The answer, it turns out, is that we don't know. No name for a jubilee beyond Platinum has been either suggested or agreed, largely on the grounds that it is considered vanishingly unlikely that we'll ever need to hold one.

For those of you already beginning to feel that all this is more than you ever wanted to know about Jubilees, I have some good news: Here Endeth The Lesson.

I was listening to The Today Programme a couple of weeks ago. It was the day that Sir John Major had given a speech that railed against the current government and spoke of how party-gate had eroded trust and lead to a huge loss of influence and respect for the UK on the international stage.

Evan Davis (or the producers) could have – off the back of that – given some snippets of what foreign medias were saying about the UK, to illustrate, complexify, or refute what Sir John had said. It would, after all, have been very interesting to hear of how our nation is currently being perceived throughout the world.

But they did not give us anything of the sort. Instead, there was only and purely ongoing chatter about the political implications of Sir John's intervention and how it might impact what Tory MPs did, to either support or try and oust the PM.

In other words, The Today Programme descended into sheer drama.


Since 2016 (and probably before) we have got used to politics becoming drama. But perhaps more significantly, the news cycles got used to it. Drama sells better than genuine political engagement – as Trump knew too well.

But our collective life, and the politics that enables it, is not a soap opera. It is an ongoing debate about and enactment of what it means to live well together, in a way that fosters justice and equity.

If nothing else, may the current drama of our gov't remind us all that we need something beyond drama, we need good and healthy politics (in every group and institution we are involved in, as well as in our national parliament).

Notices of meetings and agendas are published on the Parish Council Noticeboard near the bus shelter together with minutes, things, the Council considers local planning applications for the planning authority, the South Cambridgeshire District Council; provides the local recreation area, the People's Hall, litter bins, dog waste bins and the bus shelter; arranges for local verge cutting on behalf of the Cambridgeshire County Council and works with that authority to ensure the maintenance of local

Next Meeting: Monday 7th March 7.00 pm in The People's Hall. All welcome.

The Parish Council met on 7th Feb 2020.

The contract for the grass cutting is due for renewal and the PC discussed the responses to the request for tender that has been issued. Unfortunately none of the quotations accurately covered the scope of work issued and the pricing layout made it difficult to precisely compare the quotations. It was agreed that the companies would be asked for clarity regarding certain issues and to ensure that the figures quoted could be fairly compared. The decision regarding the contractor will be made at the next meeting.

The EWR Co has invited representatives from affected Parishes to become part of a focus group to discuss proposals and issues associated with the proposed East-West Rail. Cambridge Approaches (the group set up to ensure the proposals minimise the impact on South Cambridgeshire), are also

proposing a meeting with the same representatives assist in coordinating responses, supportive information etc. It was agreed that Cllr Yeadon would be the representative on both of these groups. It's worth noting that EWR made it clear that there will be no route proposals on the table at the first meeting as they are still reviewing the feedback from the consultation.

SCDC have asked for somebody to act as a contact to publish urgent or time sensitive messages that could affect the community such as flooding or missed bin collections (these are the two examples given) so that the messages could be disseminated in the most effective manner throughout the village. Cllr Yeadon agreed to take on this role.

The PC agreed to continue with it's membership for the Cam Valley Forum. The group is involved in the upkeep and welfare of the Cam and it's tributaries.

The PC agreed to the finance statement.

The PC discussed the Appeal that has been lodged with the Secretary of State for the proposed Co-Op store in Toft parish opposite the Village College. The PC agreed to make a submission to the Appeal which can also be viewed at www.toft.org.uk. Among other mainly challenging of the case made by the appellant and emphasising the concerns about the risks to the viability of Toft Shop should a Co-Op store open and challenging the profile of the shop written by the SCDC Planning Officer. The submission would also support the Village College's concern about safety and congestion at the start and finish times at the school.

> Cllr Tall reported on his presentation to the CC for funding and agreement to make the speed limit on school lane 20mph. This is part of the Local Initiative where PC's can Highways representations for road improvements in their Parishes. Cllr Tal is still trying to arrange a meeting with the CC to discuss ideas for improving the car parking outside of the church.

> Cllr Ellis-Evans has arranged a refresher course for CPR and the use of the defibrillator for residents. Cllr Popat reported that the Climate Change group had met (virtually) to discuss proposals for future articles for the Calendar and other initiatives.

> Cllr Ellis-Evans reported that an initial meeting had been held with residents organising events to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. (More information on this will follow.)

Wildlife Trust BCN West Cambridgeshire Hundreds Update: March 2022

Throughout the year, The Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs and Northants deliverers guided walks, events, and family sessions to help you learn more about trampling plants and compacting soil on the edges. nature, and how you can help look after wildlife on your doorstep. In the West Cambs Hundreds, the area restricted access on our website: between Gamlingay, Cambourne and Comberton, there are themed walks focusing on things like spring wildflowers or bird song, and some more general walks looking at seasonal wildlife. Family sessions run over the school holidays. Across our three counties, we also run Wildlife Training Workshops, some online, which provide more in-depth information.

Thanks to funding from Comberton Adult Education, there are some programmes where the costs of running the sessions have been covered, so they can be offered free to participants:

Wildlife for Beginners: a series of three guided walks focussing on common wildlife

The Cambridgeshire County Council Libraries Team has been awarded our Carer Friendly Tick Award (Communities), in recognition of their work to identify and support carers.

The libraries team was awarded the Carer Friendly Tick Award for reasons including having a dedicated carers champion, more than 100 library staff attending Caring Together's carers awareness sessions and their promotion of national and local carers campaigns in their enewsletter to 30,000 Cambridgeshire residents. After attending the

awareness sessions, a number of library staff identified themselves as carers. The panel was also pleased to see that a reference copy of the Caring Together Carers magazine is held in each library with extra copies for people to take away and take their time to read at home.

Cllr Tom Sanderson, chair of Cambridgeshire County Council's communities, social mobility and inclusion committee, said "I am so proud of our dedicated libraries team who thoroughly deserve this award. Our team always put the needs of others first and love to find ways to go the extra mile for the communities in which they work. Libraries have informal contact with residents which can lead to a recognition that they may need more support. All library staff have had awareness training and are approachable and empathetic. Additionally, all our libraries provide carers with a place to find information about the help and support available to them by hosting displays, meetings and events.

"Being a carer is a challenging and often lonely life, so it is absolutely essential that the hub of local communities – libraries – are a place carers turn to for support and information and a friendly ear. Libraries hold regular events which carers can attend locally, giving them the chance to socialise, meet people and take part in activities. "Our staff take great pride in always being there for others and this recognition will mean so much to all of them."

Andy McGowan, head of engagement at Caring Together, said, "Libraries play an important role at the heart of communities. Many users may well be carers, but unaware of the support available to them if they are looking after a family member or friend.

"The work the libraries are now already doing is really valued in helping make more people aware of what it means to be a carer. We are already talking to Cambridgeshire Libraries about ways we work to ensure more people are identified as carers and supported in their roles.

"With three in five of us likely to be a carer at some stage in our lives we are seeing more and more organisations in our communities recognising the importance of identifying and supporting carers of all ages.

"We are very pleased to see Cambridgeshire Libraries now having their work to identify and support carers recognised by the Carer Friendly Tick Award (Communities). We want to congratulate them on this and thank them for the work that they are doing which makes a real difference to carers.

"We hope that other communities, schools, colleges, universities and health organisations, will follow in this good work. They can develop their own ways to identify and support carers, and we are here to help them do this. As the number and awareness of carers grows this will be an ever more important part of making sure carers are given the recognition and help, they deserve."

Recycling Responsibly

What can we do to reduce the amount of household waste going to landfill and to maximise our recycling?

- Of course, our bins help us to recycle as much as we can, with the Black Bin being the place of last resort.
- The Green Bin is the least complex, taking cooked and uncooked food, untreated wood and garden waste.
- The Blue Bin is less straightforward, taking paper and cardboard, tins, glass bottles, and plastic pots and bottles.

The following is a list of trickier items showing which bin they should be placed into.

Blue bin

- Bread bags
- Bubblewrap and clingfilm
- Cereal liners
- Cheese, fish and meat wrappings
- Delivery bags
- Frozen food bags
- Multi-pack wrappings
- Plastic carrier bags
- Black bin
- Baby food, pet food, detergent and cleaning pouches
- Crisp and sweet bags
- Plastic film lids
- Salad, pasta and rice bags
- Toilet roll wrapping
- Biscuits and chocolate wrappings (non-foil Blue Bin, foil Black Bin)

However, all of these items can be recycled at certain local recycling centres.

The Co-op in Upper Cambourne and Tesco at Bar Hill each have recycling bins at their entrance that will take a range of soft plastic items. (While some of these may be placed in our Blue Bins they may not necessarily be recycled, but rather used to generate electricity.)

Note that there are also recycling points:

- for clothes and shoes at both Tesco and Morrisons
- for batteries and water filter cartridges at Sainsbury's and Tesco
- for medical blister packs at Superdrug (Sidney Street and Fitzroy Street).

Plus, of course the main recycling centre at Milton.

On the South Cambs District Council website there is a definitive list of many items showing how they should be recycled or disposed of. Please note that items need to be clean to enable recycling.


Maybe we can all increase the amount we recycle, which can only be a good thing.

Nature Recovery gets underway in Cambridge

A Grant award of £425,000 from Natural England Nature Recovery is made to the Cambridge Nature Network.

Funding is for projects that will increase the amount of nature and help to demonstrate how the Nature Recovery Network can be realised.

18 Projects are being delivered by a wide range of organisations. Projects will be completed in 2022.



Nature in Cambridge has received a boost thanks to a grant award of £425,000 from Natural England's Nature Recovery Programme. The grant is to support the delivery of the Cambridge Nature Network which was launched in May. The funding will pay for 18 projects that will increase biodiversity.

The Cambridge Nature Network identifies opportunities to double nature and increase access to natural greenspace in Cambridge and the surrounding countryside. The aim is to halt the decline in biodiversity improve climate resilience and enable nature to recover, while benefiting public health, wellbeing, and the economy.

The grant is being managed by local charity Cambridge Past, Present & Future. Their Chief Executive, James Littlewood is thrilled, "the Cambridge Nature Network vision is for significant areas of downland, fens, meadows and woodlands, where nature can recover and thrive and where people can experience a wilder countryside and nature on their doorstep. Each of these projects will create new or better habitats for nature and they range from converting 150 acres of farmland in the Gog Magog Hills, to expanding country parks and nature reserves, to small projects on school grounds in the city. The range of organisations and people involved in these projects is really inspiring, as well as Natural England it includes local charities, local councils, community groups, local landowners, schools, contractors and individual people helping to plant trees and sow seeds."

The grant is supporting a wide range of projects including:

- Restoring 58 veteran Willow Trees at Sheep's Green in Cambridge (Cambridge City Council).
- Planting trees to create a new woodland belt next to Logan's Meadow Nature Reserve in Cambridge (Cambridge City Council).
- ♦ Creating 20 acres of meadow and planting 2,000 trees as part of an expansion of Wandlebury Country Park to the south of Cambridge (Cambridge Past, Present & Future).
- ♦ Planting 2,000 trees to create 4 acres of woodland between Coton and Madingley on the western edge of Cambridge (Cambridge Past, Present & Future).
- Planting 400 trees to create a new area of woodland at Coton Countryside Reserve on the western edge of Cambridge (Cambridge Past, Present & Future).
- ♦ Creating 10 acres of new meadow on farmland near Barton (Wild Farms Trust).
- ♦ Creating 150 acres of new meadows, scrub and woodland at Lower Valley Farm in the Gog Magog Hills to the south of Cambridge (Cambridgeshire County Council).
- \diamond Working with five schools in Cambridge to improve their school grounds for nature (Cambridge On the Verge).
- ♦ Creating 7 acres of new meadow next to Fulbourn Fen Nature Reserve to the southeast of Cambridge (Wildlife Trust BCN).
- Improving habitat in the Bin Brook and its ditches near Coton to the west of Cambridge (Norfolk Rivers Trust).
- ♦ Improving habitats in and around the villages of Histon & Impington (Histon & Impington Parish Council).
- ♦ Habitat improvements on the Roman Road and encouraging landowners to help nature at Roman Road, Devils Dyke and Fleam Dyke to the southeast of Cambridge (Cambridgeshire County Council).
- Two community projects in Cambridge parks and open spaces (Natural Cambridgeshire).

Added to another seven projects which are being funded by the government's Green Recovery Challenge, there are currently a total of 25 nature recovery projects underway in the Cambridge area. Further information about all the projects can be found at www.cambridgenaturenetwork.org/current-projects/

Work on some of the projects has been taking place over the winter and 2,000 trees have already been planted by volunteers .

A partnership of organisations is supporting the Cambridge Nature Network including Wildlife Trust BCN, Cambridge Past, Present & Future, National Trust, RSPB, Cambridge Sport's Lakes Trust, Magog Trust, Cambridge City Council, South Cambridgeshire District Council and Cambridge University Botanic Garden.

The Cambridge Nature Network is one of 6 large scale nature networks seeking to recover nature for Cambridgeshire & Peterborough which are being promoted by Natural Cambridgeshire.

Mark Turner, Chief Executive of the Road Victims Trust, added: "The RVT work in partnership with the collaborated Roads Policing Units across Cambridgeshire, Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire. We enjoy a tremendous working relationship with all officers, staff, and volunteers.
