Spring into action this Easter.

For most of us, the longer evenings and warm sunshine are a welcome harbinger of spring after a long winter.



But for others it presents an opportunity to commit crime. People outside gardening or enjoying the sunshine, or away on their holidays, can be an easy target for burglars.

Between April and September last year, 532 burglaries were reported and police want to raise awareness of what residents can do to protect their homes. "Spring is a season we all look forward to, after a long, cold winter. However, it doesn't mean we should be negligent around protecting our homes", said Detective Sergeant Ashley Ryan. "Burglars are always looking for easy targets, so by taking just a few simple steps, people can make their homes less attractive to thieves."

To minimize the risk of burglary during spring and summer:

- Consider not leaving windows open during warm weather, and make sure windows and doors are locked when not at home.
- If people are going on holiday, avoid advertising it on social media.
- Keep gardening tools locked away and not out on display.
 When storing tools, make sure locks on sheds and other outdoor buildings are properly secure.
- Avoid having valuables on display during the day, especially when your home is unoccupied.

Det Sgt Ryan said: "We are working hard every day to tackle burglars and bring them to justice. But we also want to prevent crimes happening in the first place and we hope that through our online campaign we can educate and engage the public on smart security measures to protect their homes."

The Council is your locally elected Council at the first tier of local government. Meetings are open to the public and are usually held on the first Monday of each month (excepting August) at the Toft People's Hall in School Lane starting at 7.00pm.

Notices of meetings and agendas are published on the Parish Council Noticeboard near the bus shelter together with minutes, which can also be viewed at www.toft.org.uk. Among other things, the Council considers local planning applications for the planning authority, the South Cambridgeshire District Council; provides the local recreation area, the People's Hall, litter bins, dog waste bins and the bus shelter; arranges for local verge cutting on behalf of the Cambridgeshire County Council and works with that authority to ensure the maintenance of local footpaths.

Next Meeting: The Annual Parish Meeting, Monday 15th May, 7.00pm in The People's Hall. All Welcome.

The Parish Council met on 3rd April 2023.

Apologies were received from Cllr. Watson who was out of the Parish. Cllr. Yeadon declared an interest in item 6.3.1 which involved a tree works application at his property. It is duly noted that when this item was discussed, Cllr. Yeadon left the room.

The minutes of the last meeting were approved and are available on the Parish Council noticeboard.

A representative from Durham Magneto Optics Ltd introduced himself and his company which has taken over part of the building previously occupied by Cambridge Partnership. It is the intention of the new company to have an open day once they Having attended a meeting with EWR, Cllr Yeadon informed us Packs and leaflets for the Community Café.

A parishioner commented on the tree on the small green which is clearly dying. Cllr. Miles was able to inform the parishioner that the Orb Committee, in charge of organising the King's Coronation events in the village, have approved replacing the tree with a commemorative tree.

There was nothing to report on Climate Change and Green issues.

Regarding the CCC 20mph scheme, it was agreed that a bid would be put in for the whole village to become a 20mph zone, though it was noted by the Clerk that there would only be 8 applications per annum accepted.

The order for the PCB Board for speed equipment is to be they are looking to open up to other users in the future. processed.

A parishioner had complained about the speeding that continues along School Lane and asked if the speed camera could be put on the road. The PC agreed to this and Cllr. Collinson will move it in due course. Cllr. Darbyshire informed the meeting that she is still awaiting confirmation for when the 20mph signage agreed for School Lane will be installed.

The Finance Report was considered and approved.

There were no play inspection reports to consider nor any urgent issues regarding Council property but Cllr. Yeadon informed the meeting that the annual RosPo inspection is due.

Regarding Planning Applications, the Council considered the new build on land adjacent to 33 School Lane and Tree Works in Brookside.

The Village Green - Cllr. Darbyshire had sent through information regarding the purchase of boulders for the village green but it was deemed to be from a company too far away. Cllr. Yeadon is to investigate the cost of 3 boulders from Bannold Supplies in Fen Drayton and will present this at the next meeting. Before going ahead with this initiative, the Council would like to receive comments from parishioners and if you have any thoughts on whether boulders on the green is the best way forward to help prevent cars churning up the grass, or whether you have an alternative suggestion, we would be very pleased to hear from you. Regarding Highways, Cllr. Darbyshire reported that she is still awaiting information from SCDC regarding traffic calming measures and on improving road marking in the village.

There were no matters arising for the Toft People's Hall.

Cllr. Miles reported that she has been in correspondence with the Woodland Trust regarding the broken waymarker, currently propped up against a tree, on the northern entrance to Toft wood and the matter of a number of saplings damaged in strong winds. These will be investigated by the Woodland Trust.

There were no matters arising regarding the Defibrillator.

Cllr. Collinson is to investigate costs for installing the new PC noticeboard on the Birdlings estate.

Cllr. Miles updated the meeting regarding the Coronation weekend. Unfortunately, the ORB committee had been unable to book either the Molly dancers or a Magician for the children's tea party, but alternatives were being explored.

Cllr. Yeadon reported on the joint Parish Meeting which had been hosted by the District Council. The two main items on the Agenda had been for the development of Neighbourhood Plans, which focus on how a community wishes to expand its neighbourhood and on the development of chalk streams.

The Surgery team continues to expand as we strive to meet the needs of our community. Please do have a look at the photo board in the entrance lobby of the Surgery by the Dispensary hatch to familiarise yourself with our lovely team; we are going to need a bigger board soon!

Bourn Surgery is part of the Meridian Primary Care Network (PCN), and you may have already had contact from with our Health Coaches or Social Prescribing Link Workers, or you may have come to see our First Contact Physiotherapist at the Surgery. More information about the team at Meridian PCN can be found at https://meridianpcn.gpweb.org.uk/our-primary-care-network

You will also find information about the various PCN services provided on their website, including the Menopause Support Group, Long Covid Support Group and Carer's Café, as well as the Worthwhile Waiting initiative at https://meridianpcn.gpweb.org.uk/pcn-services

Bourn Surgery also belongs to a local Federation of GP practices called Cambs GP Network. Through this Federation we are able to access evening and weekend appointments to see a GP, Nurse, Healthcare Assistant or phlebotomist. These appointments are booked through Bourn Reception and can be used to access healthcare in a more convenient way. We will also offer these appointments when we have reached capacity at the Surgery, or cannot provide you with an appointment at a time that is convenient for you. These appointments are delivered at hubs across the area, with the closest being Comberton Surgery. Appointments can be booked to see a GP, to see a nurse for smear tests, dressings, asthma or diabetes reviews, contraception reviews, or routine blood tests.

Communications:

We have now launched our new Bourn Surgery website which we hope will be easier to use, but still contain relevant and useful information. The website address is the same as before; www.bournsurgery.nhs.uk

On our new website, you will find the 'Contact Us Online' button. This allows you to submit an administrative query online rather than having to contact the Surgery by telephone. You can also contact us for a medical issue, although please note that the response time for all messages received vis the 'Contact Us' is four working days, so this is not appropriate for any urgent medical issues. Please do not use this service to request an appointment; all appointments should be booked online (if you have a log-in for SystmOnline) or via telephone.



All prescription requests should be made online through the NHS App, or SystmOnline. We do not accept prescription requests by email or telephone.

HRT Prepayment Certificate:

From the 1st April 2023 the NHS is introducing a Prescription Prepayment certificate specifically for HRT medicines. Once you purchase the 12-month certificate, you will not pay the prescription fees for your HRT medications. It will save you money if you need to pay for three or more HRT prescription charges within 12 months.

It is important to be aware that not all medications licensed for use in HRT are covered by this certificate. This is important due to the multiple shortages of various HRT products, as some of the alternative products will not be covered by this certificate, and will still incur a prescription charge. This is unfortunately outside of our control, and is not something we can adjust or alter. Your GP will continue to prescribe the most appropriate HRT medication for you within what is available.

This certificate only covers HRT medications. Please note that if you are on one or more other prescriptions that you pay for, you will save more money if you buy a normal Prescription Prepayment Certificate.

Patient Participation Group:

We re-launched our Patient Participation Group (PPG) in 2020 during the pandemic, starting with some popular evening meetings on Zoom. A PPG is described as a "critical friend" of the Surgery, and is an opportunity for any patient registered at Bourn Surgery to give their views and opinions on the work of the Surgery, and to represent the voice of our patients. We are keen that our PPG reflects the diversity of the community that we serve, and in particular we are keen to ensure voices of those who are of working-age, carers, living with long-term health needs, and those who have experience of using health care services are heard.

Membership of the PPG has no fixed requirements; you can be as engaged with it as you want to be, and there may be certain issues that you feel more inspired about than others. We hold quarterly PPG meetings to discuss the ongoing work of the PPG, hear feedback from the Surgery in response to issues raised by the PPG, as well as speakers from across the practice team providing updates on new services or initiatives. In addition to the quarterly meetings, the PPG may be contacted for opinions and advice about the services the Surgery provides. Previous projects run through the PPG include a survey of patient's views on the types of appointments they would wish to have available, which fed into our re-design of the Surgery's appointment system in 2021.

Our new Surgery website will shortly have a revamped PPG section with more information. If you are interested in signing up to the PPG, please email bournppgsecretary@gmail.com. Our next PPG meeting is planned for the evening of 10th May. Invites are automatically sent to those who are signed up to the PPG; we hope to see some new members join us!

EIIR to CIIIR: Coronation memories

As we approach the coronation of King Charles III, we look back at Toft on the day when Queen Elizabeth II was crowned, 2nd June 1953. Koran Collett (Mill Lane) recalls events in the village on that day:

We all piled into what is now Ron Gouldstone's house (School Lane). A couple of sisters lived there. They were the only ones I knew who had a television, a little old nine-inch screen - all interference, couldn't see a thing hardly. And it rained and it was wet, a wet day. There was a procession in Toft, there was something going on. It was a pretty poor day.

The poster reproduced here shows the activities that were held in the village on Coronation Day. Apart from the parade, there were tea-parties and sports for children and adults, a church service and a grand social.





Koran Collett was right. It was a dismal day for the Toft Coronation procession, as the rain-coated man testifies, and the open umbrella. But in true Toft style, the parade went ahead.

On that occasion too, it was announced that a bus-shelter would be erected to commemorate the coronation. It has stood next to the village green ever since and is periodically decorated to mark festive occasions.

Northamptonshire 30 Days Wild is our annual campaign to encourage people to get outside and do something wild every day in June. There is a huge amount of research that says connecting with nature helps with stress and anxiety, improves concentration, and especially in young people, can improve self-esteem and resilience. It's easy to take part, and when you sign up, you get sent some free resources. It is suitable for any age, as everyone benefits from nature.

Here are some suggestions of things you could do:

Eat your breakfast outside and listen for three different birds

Go on a walk then write a wildlife-inspired Haiku

Visit a nature reserve, take photos of wildflowers, and do some research to identify them

Get up really early and go for a walk

Start a nature journal

Watch a sunny patch of bramble flowers for five minutes

Camp out in the garden (or join us for an over-night camp at Trumpington Meadows)

Campaign to Save Coton Orchard from new road

March we presented a petition to Cambridgeshire County Council asking them to save the Coton green corridor, spare the Coton orchard and find a better transport solution then their proposed new bus road. The petition has been signed by over 15,000 people and generated significant media coverage.

The council listened but still voted 33 to 25 to destroy the orchard and green corridor. The council will submit an application to government in May, which will trigger a public inquiry. The inquiry will determine whether permission should be given.

We are very disappointed that local politicians are seeking permission to cut down trees, destroy Cambridgeshire's largest remaining orchard and cause irrecoverable harm to ecology and landscape. There is an alternative which would improve public transport and cycling between Cambridge Cambourne and without environmental destruction, and we will need to make the case for that alternative at the public inquiry.

To do this, we have launched a Fighting Fund to pay for independent experts to provide evidence and legal representation. Thank you very much if you have already supported this appeal with a donation. https://www.cambridgeppf.org/appeal/save-thecoton-green-corridor
