Popat

The Council is your locally elected Council at the first tier of local government. Meetings are open to the public and are usually held on the first Monday of each month (excepting August) at the Toft People's Hall in School Lane starting at 7.00pm.

Notices of meetings and agendas are published on the Parish Council Noticeboard near the bus shelter together with minutes, which can also be viewed at www.toft.org.uk. Among other things, the Council considers local planning applications for the planning authority, the South Cambridgeshire District Council; provides the local recreation area, the People's Hall, litter bins, dog waste bins and the bus shelter; arranges for local verge cutting on behalf of the Cambridgeshire County Council and works with that authority to ensure the maintenance of local footpaths.

Next Meeting: Monday 1st November, 7.00 pm in The People's Hall . All welcome subject to social-distancing guidelines

Toft Parish Council met at 7.00p.m. on 4th Oct in the Peoples' Hall.

There were several contributions from residents regarding a planning application.

Also Steve Pugh thanked the Parish Council for its support for the New Cafe. The Chair thanked Steve for his efforts in getting the Cafe up and running.

During the month councillors had carried out their annual Assets Walk when the various assets around the village are inspected and any maintenance issues are considered. Most of the benches need treatment as well as the youngsters' multiplay equipment in the recreation ground. The village sign also needs some attention. It was decided that the best time to address these issues was in the spring and it was agreed to hold the repairs until then. It was agreed to refit the posts on the village green and to

replace the reflective tape around them asap.

The PC has been urged to respond to the Oxford to Cambridge Arc Vision Consultation by the District Council. This had been previously considered and it was agreed that, as a PC, we wouldn't respond although individual Councillors, of course, may.

The PC has received a request for support funding for MAGPAS. There was also a proposal to make a donation to the Woodland Trust (the owners and maintainers of Toft Wood). Both are good causes. The PC has limited funds for charity donations but this year we did budget £200 for a donation and it was agreed that we would make a donation to the Woodland Trust recognising the pleasure that Toft Wood has given many residents over the years and particularly during the pandemic.

A Planning Application was considered. (As usual planning applications from residents are not commented on in this report although they are recorded in the minutes.)

It was agreed to make an application for LHI funding to reduce the speed limit in School Lane to 20mph. Some speed limiting measures would be included in the application but details of these are yet to be decided following consultation with residents. Recently, CIIr Tall has relocated the speed monitor onto School Lane and he was able to report that while there were occasions when the 30mph limit was exceeded, the average was below 30. CIIr Tall agreed to relocate the monitor to capture the speed of vehicles in the opposite direction over the next few weeks. He has also had a good and positive response to his mail drop in School Lane to the proposal to reduce the limit on the road.

The car parking issues outside the church were discussed. Cllr Tall agreed to progress with obtaining costings for the new surfacing via the CC. It was recognised that this project would not be appropriate for progressing via LHI funding, mainly as it would have no impact on safety nor the residents of Toft as a whole, considerations which are pre-requisites.

Cllr Popat reported that another article had been written in the Calendar by the Climate Change Working Group.

Beekeeping

If one visited any of the villages of the Bourn Valley over the centuries you would have regularly seen beehives associated with these villages. Honey was a valuable source of sweetness for many country folk before the arrival of sugar cane and sugar beet and is still much appreciated for its distinctive taste and use in baking. In Toft, older residents will recall the beehives maintained by Bernie Ward, and later his son George, in the orchards along Brookside. Some will remember, as kids, being sent to purchase honey. Beekeeping, albeit mainly as a hobby, has continued in Toft up to the present day.

Throughout human history honeybees have been highly prized for the honey and beeswax they produce. As well as a much appreciated food source, honey is the key ingredient of the alcoholic drink mead which, in the Middle Ages, was a very popular tipple in the countryside. The antibiotic properties of honey have resulted in its' use in healing wounds whilst beeswax from honeybee colonies has long been used as a polish, a preserver of leather goods and, notably, in candle-making. Tallow candles used by the poor in earlier times were cheap but smoky and smelly. In contrast beeswax candles burn with a bright clear flame and virtually no smoke, so were popular with the better off and monks were great candlemakers as religious buildings had paintings, statuary and drapes to keep clean.

Wild honeybees seek out cavities, particularly in trees, to safely establish and defend their colonies. Documented evidence suggests that ancient civilisations initially hunted for wild honey in the wider landscape but eventually switched more to keeping (farming)



honeybees close to hand. Beekeeping was already well established in Britain when the Romans arrived, but these invaders spread good practice methods which have, in large part, persisted to modern times.

The value of honeybees to communities in the past is illustrated by the establishment in Anglo-Saxon times of laws referring directly to the ownership of honeybees. If a swarm left a hive and the hive's owner followed the swarm as it moved to its new home it remained their property. If the owner lost sight of the swarm, then it was considered to have reverted to being wild and could be collected and owned by anyone else who found it. The picture left shows enterprising folk banging pots and pans to try to attract a swarm to their empty hives.

fungal disease brought to the UK through

imported trees and wind-blown spores from Europe. It received a lot of press a few years back so you may be forgiven for thinking the problem has been solved, but it is an ongoing and serious issue. Only ash trees are affected, but across the UK, ash makes up a large proportion of trees, and over the next few years most of these will succumb to the disease or secondary infections. Infected trees can be dangerous to fell due to the risk of falling branches, so it is good-practice to manage them before they become too damaged.

All the woodland reserves in the area, owned and managed by Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs and Northants, have a large percentage of ash. We continue to monitor the progress of ash dieback and carry out the appropriate management (felling, thinning or leaving to provide valuable deadwood habitat). Some trees will require expensive work by specialist contractors to ensure they don't damage property or cause road accidents. We manage over 100 reserves so the cost of this work is tens of thousands of pounds.

Here are some things that could keep you safe with the increasing risk of falling branches:

- Please show caution when considering visiting woods during windy conditions
- Please respect signs on our reserves. We may close the whole site, or part of it, if there are trees at risk of falling, or we are felling
- Please only use official entrances where we can post information regarding closures. Using unofficial entrances can damage soil and plants, create disturbance to wildlife, and compromise your safety, and that of forestry workers Please report fallen trees blocking or hanging above a path,

including a photo if possible. They may be passable but not safe.



Greener heating for Comberton VC

11th October 2021

An innovative project to give Comberton Village College greener heating has been agreed.

The year-long scheme, due to start later this month, which will replace the college's oil-fired boilers with ground source heat pumps has been agreed between The Cam Academy Trust, of which Comberton VC is a member, Cambridgeshire County Council and renewable and efficient energy company Bouygues E&S Solutions.

The decarbonisation project will see heat pumps replace the aging oil boilers in the college's main plant room. These heat pumps will extract heat from 68 boreholes, each 198m deep, in the college car parks.

The new heating system is set to reduce the college's carbon emissions from heat by 66% - 233 tonnes - in the first year. As the electricity from the grid is further decarbonised this will see the reduction in emissions rise to 89% after 20 years. It will also save the college around £40,000 a year compared to operating and maintaining oil heating.

The Trust and the Council have secured £1.9 million of grant funding from Government towards the £3 million capital cost of the project, from Phase 2 of the Government's Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme.

The balance of capital investment is coming from Cambridgeshire County Council.

The heating upgrade follows from earlier work to add solar panels and install LED lighting around the college.

The next phase of the work will see the various boiler rooms around the site linked back to the main plant room by a series of pipes. Work on the boreholes is due to start in January.
