Standard Operating Procedures – Stage 4 – at St. Andrew's will be as

follows

Hands Please use the hand sanitizer on entry.

Face Coverings are encouraged when moving around the building and during busy services. You are invited to wear a covering at all times whilst in the building, if you feel more comfortable doing so.

Space You are encouraged to space about in the church. If this is not possible you are encouraged to wear a face covering, especially for singing. (If you are feeling particularly anxious then a chair can be set up at the back of church for you.)

Track and Trace You are invited to use the QR code. Cleaning High touch points will continue to be cleaned. Refreshments Will be served. You are encouraged to take these outside.

Service Details: Singing - We may sing!. You may wish to wear a face covering for this.

The Peace We will offer a sign of peace from our pews, without physical touch.

Communion Will take place at the altar rail. You are invited to walk down the left-hand side of the chancel, receive – one at a time – at the rail, and then walk back down the right (South) side of the chancel to return to your pew. If you prefer Communion can be brought to you.

Communion by 'intinction' will now be offered. The minister will take your wafer and dip it into the wine before dropping it into your hand. If you would rather receive the bread alone, please let the minister know when you come to receive.

Sunday in Toft

This month, Jake Tebbit (Comberton Rd) sent us his reminiscence of Sunday as a child in the village. To be continued in the next Calendar

The 1950s were grim, grey and grim and my memories are dim, grey and grim. Every Sunday had the same routine; breakfast, clean shoes then 'get ready for Chapel'. Put on school uniform, grey shirt, school tie, grey socks, grey shorts and newly shined shoes. Chapel was at 10.30.

The building was smaller than now with just the main room, school room and outside toilet. Our family would sit at the back on the left-hand side and I would sit next to my father in the corner on a high wicker chair that left impression marks on my bare legs. In front were my brother and sister, Clare and Paul, my mother rarely went as she was preparing Sunday lunch and I assumed that she was a heathen. Sitting in front of my brother and sister were two very old ladies Mrs Carter and Miss Smoothy, my auntie Ella, who lived at Priory Cottage, then a small, thatched cottage with a living room and kitchen downstairs and two bedrooms upstairs. What fascinated me about them was that they wore straw hats, Mary Poppins style, usually black or navy blue, held onto their heads with gigantic hat pins which seemed to go through their heads.

I enjoyed the singing which was hearty but the sermons were boring unless we were treated to a visiting lay preacher who would reminisce of times before they were 'saved', always interesting and potentially dangerous, in chapel terms anyway. Luckily, we were regularly 'saved' from over long sermons by Amos Jacklin who sat just under the pulpit. He was a wiry, slim man, always in a dark suit, waistcoat, collarless shirt and sporting a great walrus moustache, slightly yellowed by the occasional woodbine. If he felt the sermon had gone on long enough, he would deliberately shuffle his hobnail boots and, most intriguingly for me, start to twiddle his thumbs. I say twiddle his thumbs, but not 'twiddle his thumbs' as most people know it, I will explain... Take your right-hand thumb and place it on your left-hand forefinger, then bring your right-hand forefinger above and place on your left thumb. Release your right-hand thumb and left-hand forefinger and re-join above the other thumb and forefinger, repeat the pattern ad infinitum. An inoffensive activity you would think, but mesmerising, and its effect on preachers was for them to always lose their way and move quickly on to the next hymn.

West Cambridgeshire Hundreds Update: Sept 2021

Autumn is when our practical habitat management starts; this is often achieved through work parties. The Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs and Northants' work parties are regular meetings of volunteers who carry out conservation tasks on our reserves. Many sites have dedicated volunteer wardens who lead the work parties under the guidance of our Reserves Team. In our West Cambs 100s larger woodlands, the main task is coppicing. This is where trees (often hazel) are cut down low to the ground using hand tools, either in patches to create glades, or along the wide paths (called rides). Areas are cut in rotation so there are always parts at different stages of regrowth to create a diverse structure in the wood. When coppiced trees grow back, they have multiple stems and create dense areas of habitat. You will have noticed in Hardwick Wood that recently coppiced areas are fenced. This stops deer eating the new shoots. It is recommended by Natural England that 20% of larger woodlands are open areas.

The open areas are sheltered and sunny and work well for flowers like the rare oxlip, and also pollinators like butterflies. The dense regrowth areas are good for nesting sites for birds like willow warblers.

These work parties happen over the winter so they

don't disturb breeding birds. Winter is also a time when the trees are dormant and there is less sap in the branches; if trees are cut at the wrong time, they can leak sap and lose their stored sugar. Although coppicing looks destructive, it actually prolongs the life of trees and creates great habitat.

The product is sometimes sold. Long straight poles can be used for gardening supports, bigger pieces are chopped for firewood, and thinner branches can be bundled as "fascines" which are used by the trust for river restoration projects. You can arrange to buy these products by making contact with the volunteer warden.

As a charity, we rely heavily on our supporters who help practically or financially, so we can look after special places like Hardwick Wood. You can help by becoming a member, volunteering, or by supporting our events.

If you are interested in joining a work party for Hardwick Wood, sessions happen regularly throughout the autumn and winter on Saturdays. Please find the contact details of the volunteer warden on our website. They need to know you are coming in order to manage group sizes. Older children are welcome when accompanied by a responsible adult. www.wildlifebcn.org/get-involved/volunteer.

1 If you wish to be a permanent resident or citizen of the UK, you should: look after yourself and your family, and look after the area in which you live and the environment. You should also: respect and obey the law, respect the rights of others including their right to their own opinions, and treat others with fairness.

2 The official Church of the state is the Church of England. It is called the Episcopal Church in Scotland and the USA. It is a Protestant Church.

3 There has been a Scottish Parliament and a Welsh Assembly since 1999.

4 Located on the north-east coast of Northern Ireland, the Giant's Causeway is a land formation of columns made from volcanic lava. It was formed about 50 million years ago. There are many legends about the Causeway and how it was formed.

5 Diwali usually falls in October or November and lasts for five days. It is often called the Festival of Lights. It is celebrated by Hindus and Sikhs. It celebrates the victory of good over evil and the gaining of knowledge. There are different stories about how the festival came about. There is a famous celebration of Diwali in Leicester.

6 A very impressive hill fort can still be seen today at Maiden Castle, in the English county of Dorset.

7 Almost everybody in the UK who is in paid work, including self-employed people, must pay National Insurance Contributions. The money raised from National Insurance Contributions is used to pay for state benefits and services such as the state retirement pension and the National Health Service (NHS).

8 The Queen is the ceremonial head of the Commonwealth, which currently has 53 member states. Membership is voluntary.

10 There are several British overseas territories around the world, such as St Helena and the Falkland Islands. They are linked to the UK but are not a part of it.
