Arthur James Wish 1921 - 2020

Bob was born in Woodford, Essex the last of the five children. He loved growing up in Essex and then Kent where his parents ran a pub

He was 18 when the war broke out and he had many tales to tell of his time in the RAF working in signals both in the UK and most vividly of his time in Bombay from 1945-6.



He met and in due course married his WAAF girlfriend and they had three children Catriona, Barbara (now Preece) and Ian. Post-war he farmed first in Kent and then in mid-Sussex.

As a man who nearly made one hundred years he had decades of life after retiring from Farming including much travel before he settled first in Bourn and then in Toft.

Always good for a chat, with a story to tell, he will be missed not only by his three children, eight grand-children and four great-grandchildren (with one to come) but by all of us in the village whose lives he touched with humour, good conversation and of course a story!

The Council is your locally elected Council at the first tier of local government. Meetings are open to the public and are usually held on the first Monday of each month (excepting August) at the Toft People's Hall in School Lane starting at 7.00pm.

Notices of meetings and agendas are published on the Parish Council Noticeboard near the bus shelter together with minutes, which can also be viewed at www.toft.org.uk. Among other things, the Council considers local planning applications for the planning authority, the South Cambridgeshire District Council; provides the local recreation area, the People's Hall, litter bins, dog waste bins and the bus shelter; arranges for local verge cutting on behalf of the Cambridgeshire County Council and works with that authority to ensure the maintenance of local footpaths.

### Next Meeting: Monday November 2nd, 7.30 pm (via Zoom)

The PC met on 5th Oct via Zoom. There were a number of residents in attendance, primarily interested in the East West Rail. The Chair reported on the current status and the responses the PC have received from the Mayor and our MP having written to them expressing the PC's concerns. The Chair is a member of the Cambridge Approaches group who have developed some alternative routes for the approach to Cambridge South station. The PC supported the Chair's proposals for the various rankings of the had yet been taken. (see p. 9) different routes and in particular agreed that a route from a station north of Cambourne along by the A428 and then following the M11 (known as route 6) would be our strongly favoured route. The Chair reported that Cambridge Approaches are having a meeting with EWR, the MP and the leader of SCDC to discuss their preferred routes. The PC were concerned that the current route options laid out by Cambridge Approaches do not consider how the route would pass the village but, because of the position the routes ended, implied that it run south of the village. The PC was keen that there should be no implication that it

supported a route south of the village as, frankly, it hasn't considered the merits of a route either side of the The Chair agreed to ask Cambridge Approaches to end their route proposals further from the village to show no preference regarding the route around Toft. Barton PC are to form a group of concerned PC's in the area to consider how, collectively, the PC's can respond to the proposals. Cllr Tall agreed to join that group.

The PC thanked John Betson for, once again, offering to be the village's Community Gritting Volunteer. This involves gritting some of our main thoroughfares when conditions warrant it.

Age UK are to operate a Community Warden Scheme in the our village and others in the area. Cllr Yeadon agreed to meet with Age UK to understand better what will be involved.

The PC has received a request for financial support for MAGPAS. This was discussed, recognising the valuable service they provided. However, in the past the PC has not supported charities as it's difficult to decide which ones to support and, of, course, it is public monies. Furthermore the PC has not budgeted for such contributions. It was agreed not to make a contribution but the PC agreed to consider having funds allocated for such giving, (if the PC is allowed to) at the next budget round.

The PC pays for the unmetered electricity used by the street lighting and it agreed to a quotation from OPUS electricity to supply that power.

The PC considered two planning applications.

Cllr Popat reported that he has made an application for a Zero Carbon Communities Grant for improvement to the cycle path between Toft and Comberton.

Cllr Yeadon reported that the property next to the People's Hall has come up for sale and that there was some interest from within the village to purchase it as a village asset for additional recreational space. Cllr Yeadon noted this was early days and no decisions

Cllr Miles presented the proposals for Operation London Bridge which lays out how the PC and village would respond to the death of the Queen. These proposals were supported.

Cllr Miles has signs to discourage cyclists and horse riders from using the footpaths around the village. It was agreed to ask our odd job contractor to work with Cllr Miles to install the signs.



#### **ETHELDREDA MEDAL**

Bishop Stephen writes: Every other year, I award The Etheldreda Medal to people across the Diocese whose service to the community (which might be as 'local' as their extended family but could be as extensive as a national or international concern) is both 'generous' and 'outstanding'.

I am looking for exceptional people whose good works haven't yet been recognised; those who might (in partnership with others) come close to being nominated for a Queen's Award for Voluntary Service. For many people this will be about the duration and persistence of their good works, for others it may relate to a short but extraordinary act of kindness or course of conduct.

This year, we are delighted to report an Etheldreda Medal was presented to Dr Peter Johnson in Ely Cathedral by the Bishop on St. Etheldreda's day, 17th October during a beautifully sung Evensong.

His citation reads:- Peter has used his professional expertise on the church building in Toft and contributes in so many other ways to the life of this community. Tireless in many pursuits, his contribution to the life of the community is both valuable and valued. 




# Water, water everywhere

Because of the way Toft gently slopes down the Bourn Valley to end at Bourn Brook, the Brookside area (known to locals as 'Bottom End') is prone to occasional flooding. This is by no means new. The local historian John Layer (1586-1640) of Shepreth, recorded a visit to Toft in the 1630s. In his journal he notes that Toft is a "prettie village of about fiftie families" but that the brook often floods and makes it impossible to pass, even though there was a decent wooden bridge:

Addit. MS. 5823, p. 174. Toft. "Hath the neighbourhood of a small brook, which upon the fall of rains overflowed the meadows adjoining and oft times denieth passage, though it hath a wooden bridge over it erected to a good height."

In the 19<sup>th</sup> century, Brookside was aptly known as Water Row. The wooden bridge was in time replaced by a more substantial concrete structure but floods continued to cause problems in the 20<sup>th</sup> century, including a notable one in February 1935.

By the late 1980s, it was clear that a wider bridge was needed over the brook to replace the old concrete bridge, and between December 1988 and March 1989, work went on to build the bridge we see today. A temporary bridge carried traffic and people during construction. The Bourn Brook is more managed these days but nevertheless, in more recent times, notable floods have occurred at Bottom End in 1989, 2009 and 2012. Even the new bridge can often barely contain the water level.



Toft care home launches fundraising drive to purchase high-tech sensory table for residents

he team at Home Meadow residential home in Toft, Cambridgeshire, is calling upon its local community support a fundraising effort to bring high-tech sensory equipment into the home.

The home provides dedicated residential care for up to 49 people with a range of needs, including sensory impairments and dementia.
