Editorial

It's up there with the world's great unanswerable questions, such as: If God Is All-powerful, Could He* Create A Rock So Heavy That He Couldn't Shift It? or: Why Don't Birds Ever Use Nest Boxes? And yet, here we are, with yet another insoluble mystery on our hands. How can an Englishman travel a scant few miles in his own country and yet feel more abroad than he does in Paris, Berlin or Rome? If I were to tell you that the English person concerned was an effete southerner (me) and the place travelled to was that mysterious, scary region often referred to, in covert whispers, as 'Up North', then maybe you'll sympathise. It's not just the weather (sleet, mostly), it's the sudden cultural backflip - all your assumptions and norms somersaulting out of the window.

Take shopping, or dining out, or, well, almost anything where one party is trying to get their mitts on another party's hard-earned pelf. You might imagine that the party of the first part, as we hepcats like to call it, would be solicitous, emollient - perhaps, even, welcoming. It was with this zany expectation that we entered a local eatery to ask if, mayhap, they had such an item as a cheese scone for sale. The owner stared at us as if we'd asked for a kitten sandwich. 'We have not,' he said, brusquely, 'and you'll not find anyone else round here selling them, neither. There's no call, see?' We trooped meekly out, mentally castigating ourselves for not having boned up on local knowledge aforehand and I could have sworn I heard a voice behind us mutter, 'What a pair of dumbos' - but I may have imagined it. Things didn't exactly improve when, by now more than peckish, we rolled into a competing dive down the road a bit. 'This looks OK,' whispered my helpmeet. 'Look, they've got proper doilies.' We took a seat. And it is at this point, my fellow southerners, that I must ask you to brace yourselves. Even, perhaps, to hide this otherwise irreproachable periodical from impressionable young eyes or family members of a vapourish inclination. Because there, on the menu, in unmistakable type, was the item: 'Ham Sandwich (With Gravy - add 0.50p)'. In what possible parallel universe does a person halfway through a ham sandwich stop and think, 'What this needs is a ladleful of Bisto sloshed over it'?

C2C Busway

The results of the planning enquiry into the construction of the Cambourne to Cambridge busway are now in and it looks as though the project will go ahead. According to the possibly slightly biased Bonkers Busway website, the inspectors concluded that the scheme "would not do anything to relieve congestion and improve journey times to the east of Grange Road in the City Centre". Any improvement in air quality would be "limited", even before the irony of felling mature trees and destroying habitat that absorbs carbon, filters pollution and helps produce the air we breathe.

Nor does the Order deliver an affordable bus service. It provides infrastructure on which buses might run. Fares and services will

depend on operators and the Combined Authority, while Mayor Paul Bristow has repeatedly said he cannot guarantee the assumed services.

So why approve it? Read the conclusions and the overriding justification is growth: enabling housing and economic development.

The economics deserve scrutiny too. The initial benefit-

cost ratio is around 0.5:1, classed as poor value for money. Put simply, about 50p of benefit for every £1 invested.

At some point, the new busway will have to go over, or under, the new railway, which will also serve Cambourne to Cambridge. Any suspicion that the right hand has no idea what the left hand is doing is, of course, groundless.

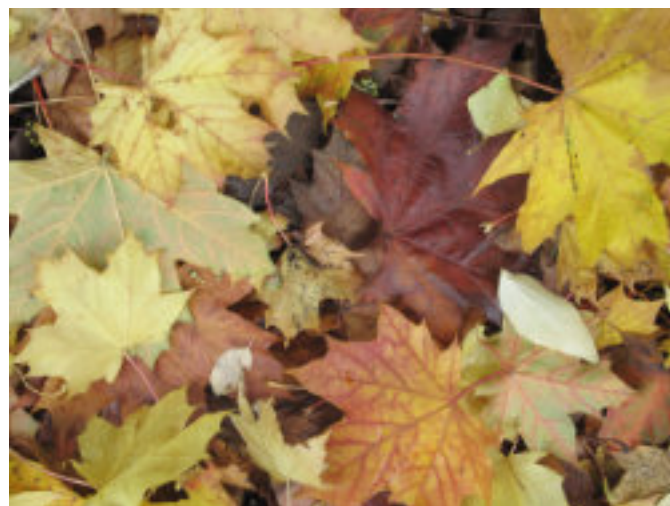

Is this autumn?



Is this autumn? Following these strange months, we will welcome the return of the Warm Hub. At the moment the dahlias' amazing colours decorate the path to Caldecote, everywhere the pyracanthas are laden with brilliant orange and yellow and the juice of blackberries continues to stain the pavements. However, autumn can bring gloom to many – shortening days, plunging temperatures, and bare gardens can bring depression to the bravest souls. Many authors have written on this and here are a few. 'No spring nor summer beauty hath such grace, As I have seen in one autumnal face' wrote John Donne in the seventeenth century. In L. M. Montgomery's novel, Anne of Green Gables remarks that we should be 'glad to live in a world where there are Octobers'. And George Eliot wrote in a letter to a friend, 'Is not this a true autumn day? Just the still melancholy that I love - that makes life and nature harmonise. The birds are consulting about their migrations, the trees are putting on the hectic or the pallid hues of decay, and begin to strew the ground, that one's very footsteps may not disturb the repose of earth and air, while they give us a scent that is a perfect anodyne to the restless spirit. Delicious autumn! My very soul is wedded to it, and if I were a bird I would fly about the earth seeking the successive autumns'. And from the Victorian novelist Samuel Butler, 'Autumn is the mellow season, and what we lose in flowers we more than gain in fruits.' But for me there is but one writer who has captured autumn, acutely and skilfully. Who can beat John Keats' *To Autumn*, written on 19th September 1819?

*Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness,
Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun;
Conspiring with him how to load and bless
With fruit the vines that round the thatch-eaves run;
To bend with apples the moss'd cottage-trees,
And fill all fruit with ripeness to the core;*

*Hedge-crickets sing; and now with treble soft
The red-breast whistles from a garden-croft;
And gathering swallows twitter in the skies.*

May autumn be special for all of us.

The Council met on Monday 7th September 2026 in the People's Hall

Next Meeting: The next meeting will be Monday 5th October 2026 at 7.00pm in The People's Hall. All Welcome.

Comments from Members of the Public

A member of the Plymouth Brethren spoke to the meeting and advised that, as they would like to enclose the building, hitherto known as the Methodist Chapel, and the adjoining car park, preferably with a small hedge, they wish to move the Memorial plaque on the High Street wall to a place where villagers can access it and asked the PC to consider where this could be moved to. In addition, they are to move the entrance to the back of the building, which will minimise noise of worshippers leaving the building. They have a "Rapid Response Team" willing to engage in small community activities, such as litter picking.

A resident reported that on the footpath by the side of the car park, a concrete block needs removing and the overgrown hedge at the High Street end needs cutting back.

The District Councillor, Catherine Hubbard, reported that she is keen to follow up on requests for a zebra crossing on the High Street. Cllr Darbyshire pointed out that she had discussed this idea with Highways but the response had been negative due to the road layout. Cllr Darbyshire will contact Highways again.

There were no apologies for absence or declarations of interest and the minutes of the last meeting were approved with a few amendments by Cllr Darbyshire.

Matters Arising

The PC was very pleased to welcome Paul McCarthy as a new member of the Parish Council.

Cllrs Darbyshire and Miles reported that the overhanging vegetation on the footpath between Toft and Comberton has been cut back and that CCC will clear soil and grass, which has encroached, to restore the path to its original width.

Regarding the Finding Fitness climbing wall, Cllr Miles reported that on 15th July she had an acknowledgement from the National Lottery Community Fund and was advised that a response could take up to 16 weeks.

The RoSPA report was considered at the last meeting and Cllr Yeadon reported that the reported minor repairs were underway.

Cllr Miles confirmed that she had looked again at the positioning of a new bench on Mill Drift and reported that there is a wonderful view at the end of the houses overlooking undulating small hills. It was agreed that the PC would purchase a new bench.

Cllr Miles confirmed that she had purchased new "Pick up after your dog" signs and was putting these in place.

Quotes for the refurbishment of the benches and map information boards had been brought to the meeting and it was agreed that Cllr Yeadon would choose the most economical quote.

Cllrs Howling and Darbyshire agreed examine instructions for using the new PC website and councillor emails, after which an article will be put in the Calendar advising residents of them.

Correspondence

Cllr Yeadon reported that he had received notification that the ACV listing for Toft shop will expire in approximately 12 months' time and proposed the item is deferred onto the Agenda for that time.

It was agreed that the PC would not reply to the consultation on the Greater Cambridge Local Plan as there were no significant changes in this immediate area, ***(For information, the day after the meeting, an email was issued by government that they are reviewing Local Government Reorganisation and hence any changes for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough have been paused whilst the review is carried out.)***

It was agreed that there was no need to reply to the Scoping Consultation and Call for Sites in the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Minerals & Waste Local Plan review.

It was agreed to fund the request for improvements to the Jubilee Green from a resident who is managing the grass and hedging. Cllr Darbyshire's request for funding to plant some spring bulbs on the village green was agreed and they could combine their orders when purchasing. It was noted that, where possible, "wild" native spring flowers would be ordered to maintain the natural rural look of the village.

It was pointed out that the Parish and Town Survey

from ACRE was addressed to the Clerk and needed no response from the PC.

Cllr Darbyshire reported that she has expressed an interest in attending the ACRE Annual General Meeting 2026.

Cllr Miles talked the PC through the Cambridgeshire Rights of Way Improvement Plan survey and will submit the responses on behalf of the Council.

Finance, etc.

The finance report was considered and the payment of bills approved.

Play inspection reports had already been dealt with and there was no matter arising which was considered a risk or danger to health and safety.

Planning/Tree Works

No requests had been received.

Members' Items

Cllr Yeadon reported that the new picnic benches for Lot Meadow were to be delivered on 9th September and once Cynan and Tricia had returned from holiday, these would be installed.

Cllr Miles reported that the Clerk for Kingston had written to the landowner regarding the overgrown footpath leading from B1046 towards Kingston but had had no response.

Regarding the Defibrillator, the Clerk is to order a new battery. Cllr McCarthy has agreed to take over its maintenance once he has been fully instructed in its use. Cllr Darbyshire will arrange a training course for the village, which will be advertised when a date is agreed.

Cllr Coghlan reported that students are not using the zebra crossing and it was suggested that anyone concerned should write to the college as this was a matter for them.

Cllr Miles proposed the creation of a Disaster Management Plan for the village given the effects of global warming. Cllr Howling is to take the lead on this and will draw up an initial all-season plan of action. Once the plan is agreed, it will be published in the Calendar.

It was agreed that the amount of promotional material at the entrance to the Mount and outside the village shop was excessive, not in keeping with a small village and obscured vision for drivers. This is to be reported to Highways.

Cllr Miles reported that the top part of the map sign opposite the village green had fallen off and needed repairing and that the one by the bridge on Brookside had disappeared.

Cllr Yeadon proposed that we carry out Village Hero Awards as last year, a request will be put in the Calendar for nominations and awards made at the annual Christmas dinner.

It was agreed that the programme that Cllr Yeadon had used to convert data from the Speed Camera provided excellent information and will be passed on regularly to the Speed Watch team.

The meeting closed at 9.45pm.

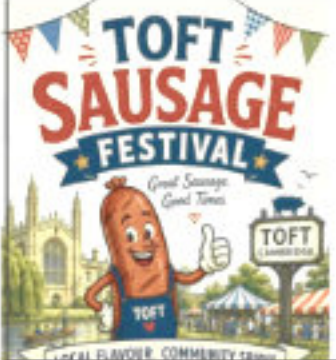
Everyone has a story to tell

Toft 1895

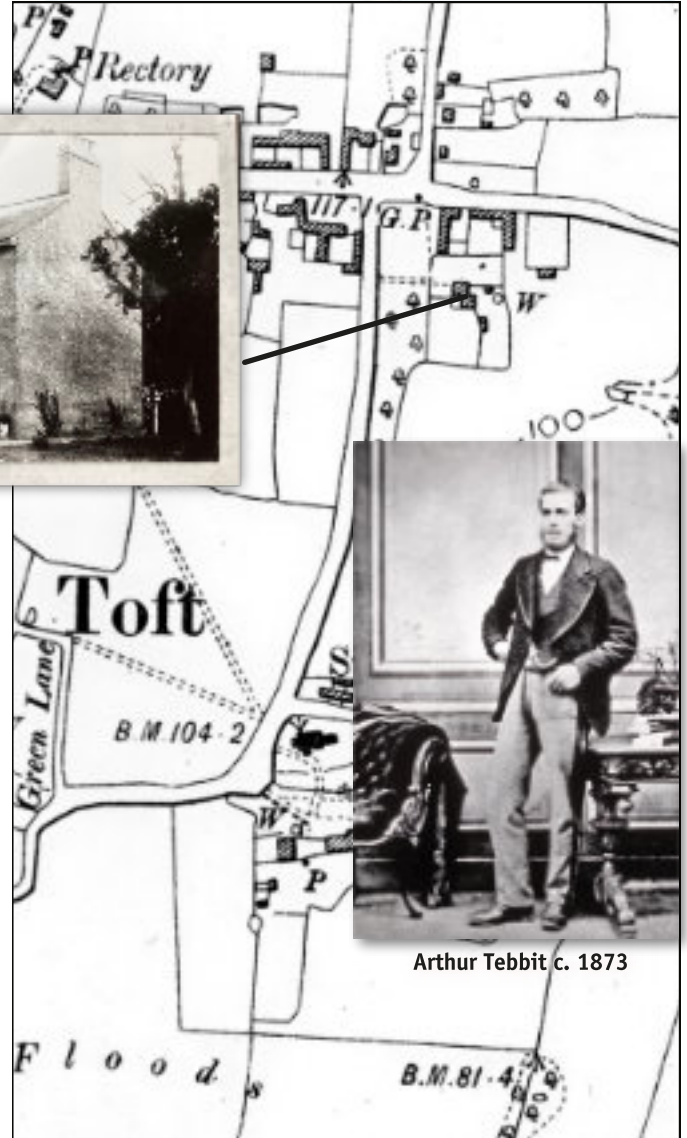
PART 8

May Creek's memoir of Toft in 1895 now leads us across the Comberton Road from Old Farm to South View then back again across the road to Orchard Farm, describing who lived where.

Now we cross the road to South View, with Joe Warboys as tenant rented from A. Tebbit at, I think, £20 per annum. Mr W. was not a satisfied tenant and early in the 1900s or late 1800s built the two cottages in School Lane, living in the larger himself. Here Mrs Warboys died in 1906. Now Hardwick Rd: on the corner a cottage occupied by Mr and Mrs Alf Collett, with Arthur, who they took when his mother died. Next to them, the house owned by the Radfords, who lived at Hardwick Wood, occupied by Ebenezer Creek and family, a son and daughter Maude, later Mrs Peach. Ebenezer was a snob*, a good one. Here he made and mended boots and shoes. Now we cross to Orchard Farm, occupied by Mr. A Tebbit, four sons and three daughters and a delicate wife. A place to revive memory of Christmas parties, Sunday school treats, all associated with Orchard Farm. Here Mr. A Tebbit lived till 1915, when he crossed the road to South View with his new wife Annie. Leaving Orchard Farm, we go out by the white hand gate onto that little used path to the church, very much a drift until the Reverend Powell decided his members needed a decent path and had Church Path Toft and Sand Path to Caldecote made usable. Church cottages, three in number. In the first one lived Betsy Freestone and her mother; in the second a Mr and Mrs Joe Creek (horsekeeper for the Tebbits); in the third a family called Jacobs, I think.

NATURE DIARY



Nature With Us

It's the 2nd of September, and the swallows and house martins are lined up on the aerial cable that spans the garden. Is this the last day we shall see them? They twitter excitedly, feeding constantly, preparing for their long journey south to warmer climes. But what dangers do they face, both natural and human? Will they find what they need – food, water, safe passage? As for our native birds, they're now emerging from their summer moult – hence all the feathers lying around – and signalling their presence once again with song.

The last few months have been so very hot, so very dry. We've all had to find clever ways to keep cool and to conserve every drop of water to save our gardens. But if we've found it hard, how much more difficult it must be for the creatures living around us. Even the tiniest ants searched for every drop of water – to the extent of marching like explorers into my kettle, so that each morning these tiny creatures had to be fished out of that first cup of tea!



Insects, birds, mammals, every creature around us, they all need the same as we do – food, water and shelter. Yet we're the cause of so much of their distress, often simply because we're thoughtless, inconsiderate. Tin cans can trap small mammals, paper and general trash cause blocked drains when the rain does fall, and glass bottles – which are found a-plenty in hedges and ditches around the village – are a potential fire hazard.

Storms are forecast, which can be as much a danger to the natural world as to us. But we can help the creatures living in and around our gardens by providing food and water and even safe shelter in the way of trees, hedges, woodpiles and other untended areas.

To those birds facing another long journey across land, sea, desert: go safely, friends – and return again next year to give us the deep pleasure of your presence. And for our resident companions, we welcome you!

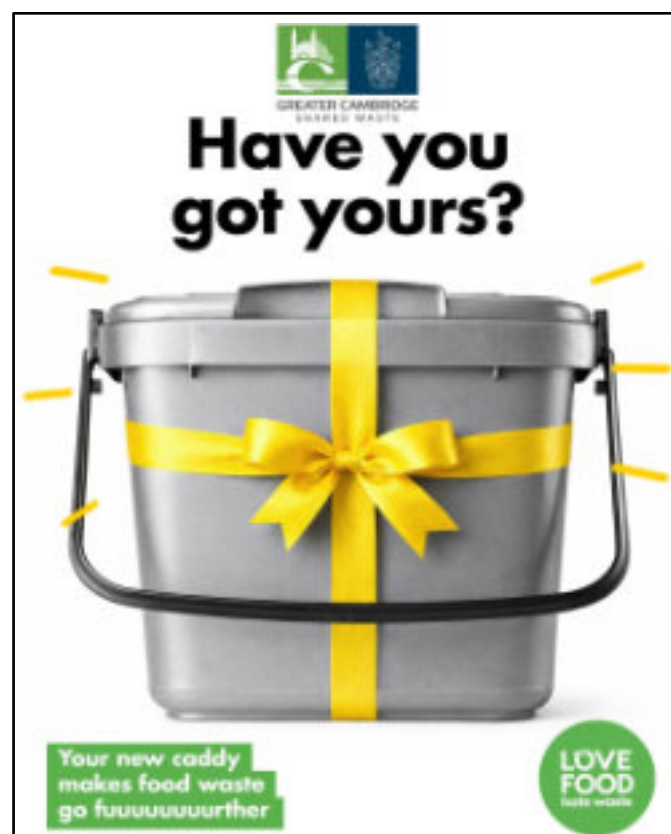
